NEW ISSUES One Hundredth Anniversary of the Slovak Insurrection



To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Slovak National Insurrection, the Ministry of Posts issued on August 27, 1948, a series of three commemorative stamps of the following denominations and colors:

1.50 Kcs red brown 3 Kcs red 5 Kcs blue

The stamps bear the portraits of three of the leaders of the uprising: M. J. Hurban on the 1.50, Ludovit Stur on the 3. and M. Hodza on the 5. Kcs. The designing of the three stamps was entrusted to prof. Karel Svolinsky.

At the top of each of the stamps is the legend "Ceskoslovensko," while the numerals of value are just below between the left outer frame and the head of the subject. The title of each of the designs appears immediately above the lower frame line.

Each of the values was engraved by a different artist: the 1.50 by J. A. Svengsbir, the 3. by L. Jirka and the 5. Kcs by J. Mracek. The names of the designer and engraver are found below the bottom frame line toward the right corner.

The stamps are printed from 100 subject steel engraved plates of the large size vertical rectangle and as is customary with this format, contain 12 printed coupons, 6 on each side. The design of the coupons was prepared by the author of the stamps, prof. Svolinsky and the engraving was done by the engraver of each stamp proper.

The stamps will be valid for both inland and foreign postal purposes up to August 31, 1949.

From another source we learn that this uprising against the Magyar overlords was abetted by Austria who at that time fought the Magyars who were trying to throw off the yoke of the Hapsburgs. Austria beat the Hungarians, gave Hungary an almost equal place with itself in the dual monarchy and then gave Slovakia back to the Hungarians who mistreated the Slovaks more than ever before, in retaliation for the help given Austria. History repeats itself,

It is understood that a stamp commemorating the 30th anniversary of the Republic is being prepared and from the description received it will be a curious hodge-podge of: 1, a working man's family; 2, Mount Rip and 3, a nationalized factory.

A commemorative souvenir sheet celebrating the 30th anniversary of the first Czechoslovakian postage stamp will consist of a single design of the 1000h Hradcany. It will be issued November 15, 1948, and from the description will be something really nice.

The charity stamps, Detem (Pro Juventute), may be issued about December 18th. This day may be designated as the "Day of the Postage Stamp."

A new definitive series is in preparation with the head of president Gottwald replacing the heads of Benes, Masaryk and Stefanik. This, of course, was expected.

There is talk of a stamp honoring Fucik, but nothing definite on that score yet.

Kosice Issue



This series of stamps was prepared in a printery in Kosice and produced by the offset process on white, unwatermarked paper. The first three values were issued imperforate; the remaining four values were rouletted 12½. The stamps portraying Red Army soldier were printed in sheets of 240 stamps (2x100 and 2x20), with horizontal gutters between the 100 and 20 subject portions of the sheets and with vertical gutters between the 100 and 100 and between the 20 and 20 subject portions. Thus it is possible to have pairs with vertical and horizontal gutters as also blocks with cross gutters. The horizontal stamps showing clasped hands and symbolizing brotherhood of Slavic Nations were printed in sheets of 120 subjects. Plate numbers appeared in the lower left corner of the sheet except on the 2Kcs where plate number appeared in both right and left bottom corners. Shades exist in all.

Of these stamps the soldier type was first issued March 26th and the clasped hand type was issued May 9th, 1945, in Kosice and after the complete liberation were in use throughout the Republic until they were demonetized January 31, 1946, in Bohemia, Moravia and Silesia and February 28, 1946, in Slovakia. Issued in commemoration of the return of President Eduard Benes and his Committee of National Liberation, April 15, 1945. Printed by the offset method in a printing establishment in Turciansky sv. Martin, Slovakia. Light olive burelage covers the sheet. Issued imperforate.

Bratislava Issue

Printed by the neotype (photogravure) process in Bratislava on unwater-marked paper and issued imperforate. There were two printings of this design: first printing: sheets of 100 subjects with wide spacings between stamps; second printing: sheets of 200 subjects with narrower spacing between stamps. In some values the shades of the two printings are very dissimilar so that singles can be placed into the correct grouping but blocks show this very easily. First day of use was April 30, 1945 and as fast as distribution could be effected were used throughout the Republic until they were demonetized January 31, 1946 in Boh., Mor. and Sil. and February 28, 1946, Slovakia. Praha Issue



Between May 24th and October 8th, 1945, the new Czech government utilize! the linden leaf motif used in the former Protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia. The lower values were printed by the photogravure process on unwatermar ed paper and perforated comb 14. The balance of this issue was printed from steel engraved plates on the Stickney rotary press and perforated line 12½. Only the 60h value appeared in both printings.

We have no record of how many of these stamps were issued.

Dates of issue: No. 18: Oct. 8; 19: June 8; 20: May 26; 21: May 23; 22: June 11; 23: Oct. 8; 24: May 26; 25 and 26: June 11. All in 1945.

The following six stamps were printed in Moscow by the photogravure

process and brought with the Red Army and the Committee of Liberation which worked in the Soviet Union to the liberated territories of former Czechoslovakia (with the exception of Carpathia-Ruthenia, which was part of the price paid to Russia for freedom [?]). Originally only the 50h, 1K and 2K were used, their first day of issue was July 16, 1945; the 5h, 10h, and 20h came about a year later. Printed on plain, unwatermarked paper and line perforated 121/4. In this issue are found many imperfections, evidence of a sloppy job. These stamps are still in use (September, 1948). The portrait is that of the president-liberator, Thomas G. Masaryk.

London Issue



Just as the Moscow issue was brought to the liberated country from the East, so this issue was brought from the West. It is a very interesting group because it portrays Czechs and Slovaks who fought outside their land iin the Armies of the Allies and gave their full measure that the world may know that

Czechoslovaks hate despots. The portraits show:

- 5h Staff Captain Ridky, British Field Uniform, fell at Alamein
- 10h Army surgeon Novak, French Uniform, died in London during the Blitz
- 20h Captain Otakar Jaros, Russian Uniform, fell at Sokolov
- 25h Captain Cimprich, French Foreign Legion, perished in air fight
- 30h First Lt. Jiri Kral, French Uniform, fell during the Battle of France
- 40h Sgt. Josef Gabcik, British Parachutists Uniform, one of the four parachutists flown from England to Czechoslovakia. It is Gabcik who killed Heydrich. He was later shot in a pitched battle with the Gestapo.
- 50h Staff Captain Vasatko, British Air Uniform, killed in battle of Britain
- 60h Pvt, Frank Adamek, British Tropical Uniform, fell at Tobruk

The printing was from steel engraved plates on white, unwatermarked paper and perforated comb 11½. These stamps are still in use (September, 1948). First day of use, August 18, 1945.

Partisan Issue

This series of stamps was issued to commemorate the first anniversary of the revolt of the Slovaks in Banska Bystrica against the nazi despots. The stamps were printed by the photogravure process on white unwatermarked paper and perforated line 10½. They were produced in a printing shop at Banska Bystrica and issued in sheets of 100 subjects. This issue of stamps was demonetized January 31, 1946, in Bohemia, Moravia and Silesia and February 28, 1946, in Slovakia. Total number issued:



This series of five stamps was printed on a cardboard, ungummed commemorative sheet, which additionally, depicted the horrors of war. The stamps were not perforated but a simulated perforation was drawn around each subject. The sheets sold for 50 crowns and the proceeds were given to the widows and orphans of partisans. Total number of sheets issued: 162,000.

This stamp was not listed in the 1948 Scott catalog, but we understand it will be mentioned but not listed in the 1949 cat.

1945-46 Portrait Issue

All the preceding stamps may be rightfully classed as provisional or temporary issues and this series which made its original debut October 28, 1945, is really the first definitive issue of the second Republic. The three stamps honored as the first issued of the series (30h Stefanik, 60h Benes and 1.20Kcs Masaryk) could also come under the heading as commemoratives because they were issued on the anniversary of the Republic, Czechoslovakian Independence Day. The stamps were printed by two processes:

- Day. The stamps were printed by two processes:
 1. 50h, 80h, 1.60K and 15K were printed in sheets of 100 subjects, comb perforated 14, on white unwatermarked paper.
- 2. Balance of the issue was printed in sheets of 200 subjects, line perforated 12½, on white, unwatermarked paper.

There are two types of the 2.40K stamp: Type 1: The drawing of the face consists of weaker lines, the blending of the background into the white area behind the head, is very noticeable. The zero in the figure of value is more eliptical.

Type II. Stronger lines in the face, the lines in the background stop abruptly instead of blending into the white area. The zero is rounded. The tail of the "2" is slightly shorter.

The first days of the issue are as follows: 30h, Oct. 28, 1945; 50h, Dec. 10, 1945; 60h, Oct. 28, 1945; 80h, Dec. 10, 1945; 1K, April 5, 1947; 1.20K red, Oct. 28, 1945; 1.20K violet, Feb. 25, 1946; 1.60K, Dec. 10, 1945; 2.40K, Dec. 14, 1945; 3K, Nov. 15, 1945; 4K, Mar. 5, 1946; 5K, Nov. 15, 1945; 7K, Dec. 10, 1945; 10K, Nov. 15, 1945; 15K, Dec. 20, 1945; 20K, Mar. 5, 1946.
