## SOCIETY SUCCESSES AT NOJEX 94

Our participation in NOJEX 94 turned out to be a bonanza for our members and for collectors of Czechoslovak philately in general.

The 51 frames of Czechoslovak material (out of 274) captured no less than 13 awards - 9 of these went to Society members. Jerry Verner's Czechoslovak Siberian Field Post exhibit won no less than 5 awards: NOJEX Reserve Grand Award, the Postal History Society Award, the Rossica Award for best Russian Exhibit, a NOJEX Gold Medal, and last, but far from least, our Society's Award for best Czechoslovak Exhibit. Accompanying our award was a 12 inch Queen Anne's Lace cut glass crystal vase. Mirko Vondra's Hradčany exhibit received a well deserved Vermeil, as well as one of the four Section Awards. Ed Lehecka's 1919 Legionnaire Issue and Bob Koschalk's German Occupation of Czechoslovakia both won Silver. Finally, non-member (for now) James Lewis' German Military Mail in Bohemia-Moravia corralled a NOJEX Vermeil, the APS Research Award, the APS Award(since 1940), and the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors Creativity Award.

The highlight of the well attended Society dinner was the bestowal of Honorary Member of the Society status upon long time member Richard Major. Dick had been active as Editor and co-editor of the SPECIALIST, many-times Board member, and I-can't-remember-when-he-wasn't-there participant of Society activities from coast to coast, including overseas. As a memento of this event, the Society presented Dick with an authentic copy of the Thaler of St. Joachimsthal from

### WOLFGANG FRITZSCHE (1904 - 1994)

The Society mourns the passing of Wolfgang Fritzsche, member no. 26, who died suddenly at his home in Canandaigua, New York, at the age of 90. One of the Society's founding members, Fritzsche organized its sales and exchange circuit and served as one of its directors for many years. (See H. Alan Hoover's article on page 21 of the May/June 1994 issue).

In addition to his devoted service to the S.C.P., he was active in the German Philatelic Society, the A.P.S. and he founded the Finger Lakes Stamp Club which still meets regularly in his home town of Canandaigua. He served as judge in many shows both here and abroad. In 1987, our Society made him an honorary member (see Sept. 1987 SPECIALIST, pages 10-11).

Few members are aware that besides philately, Fritzsche was a world traveler and photographer and was one of the pioneers in setting up one-man travelogues showing his colored slides of distant places he visited.

Fritzsche is survived by his wife, Louise, and the two were preparing to celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary this October. His widow is currently in a state of ill health. Through his executor, he donated his complete collection of SPECIALISTS to our Society.

## THE SOVIETS' "OPERATION DANUBE"

August 21, 1968 is very difficult to forget for those who lived through it. It was the date that Czechoslovakia was invaded by the so called "friendly" states. So that the reader is able to envisage the armed forces involved, it is necessary to support it by numbers:-

Operation Danube involved 575,000 soldiers, 6,500 tanks and about 1,000 planes and helicopters. Among the occupational forces were also units of the Polish Army (WP-Wojsko Polskie), which consisted of 27,780 soldiers, 550 tanks, 440 transporters, 450 pieces of artillery and 38 planes and helicopters. In the town of Kladsko (Kłodzko) in the Polish territory, the rear was safeguarded by 3,500 soldiers.

I survived the August 21, 1968 occupation in Pardubice. The Soviet Motorized Units (SA - Sovetskaja armija) moved slowly south across the town. Understandably Poles were among them, they themselves then located about 4 km north of the town near the Kunětic Mountains in a forest. From the roadside it was possible to observe the patrols and now and then a vehicle. Otherwise the artillery, with their barrels pointed at the town, were allegedly inside the forest. I remember that during the course of a meeting, we were told the Commanding Officer issued a warning that should there be

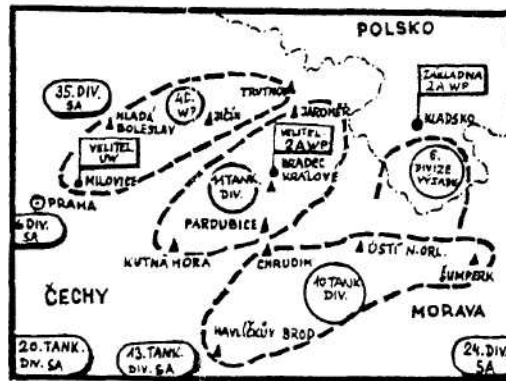

any disturbances, he would commence firing. This is how it was then, but amazingly no one made much of it, and no one believed that the Polish commandant would be so determined.

In view of the forces' colossal size, naturally one would think that a Field Post Office must have been in existence. Above all, the soldiers would like to communicate with their families at home, so they could write about what was happening to them and conversely families at home would be concerned about their sons. It was impossible to obtain, during that time or even later, postally-carried documents. Only at the end of 1993, K. Lachowicz wrote an article to the Polish Filatelistyky regarding the situation. (Here it should be pointed out that for the past twenty years a Soviet garrison had been stationed near Pardubice. It was impossible to obtain from them postally used covers. On the other hand, their soldiers would offer to sell you anything, including a telescope.)

From Poland, Operation Danube was secured by the 2nd Army (2A WP). It consisted of the 10th and 11th Tank Divisions, the 4th Mechanized and the 6th Parachute Divisions. To them were also attached the 1st Tank Regiment from the 16th Tank Division, the 27th Tank Regiment from the 5th Tank Division, the 7th Radiotechnical Regiment, and additionally parts of the 47th, 49th and 56th Helicopter Regiment, 1st Independent Strike Battalion and the 11th and 17th Squadron of Courier air planes.

The Polish units participated in the Operation from August 21, 1968 to the 12th of November 1968 on a territory of 20,000km (about 16% of Czechoslovakia). Polish Command Posts were set up in the towns of Chrudim, Havlíčkův Brod, Hradec Králové, Jaroměř, Jičín, Kutná Hora, Mladá Boleslav, Pardubice, Šumperk, Trutnov and Ústí nad Orlicí. (For details

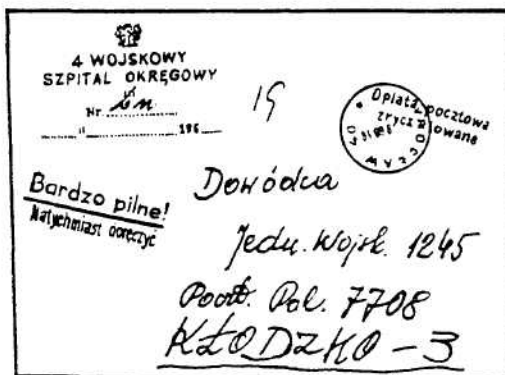

on this massive campaign, see map in Fig. 1).

Postal contacts between soldiers and home was ensured by a special combined postal system, which served not only the military, but also the civilian postal service. From that it can be deduced that normal correct requirements for running of the Field Post were missing. In Hradec Králové, a Field Post Sorting Office was established at the 2A WP Command and a Field Post Office functioned at the Divisional level. From the map (Fig. 1) it is possible to deduce that these Commands were in Jičín (9th div.), Pardubice (11th Tank Division), and somewhere between Chrudim and Ústí nad Orlicí the 10th Tank Division, with the 6th Division somewhere around Lichkova. The Field Post office number (or Sorting Office number) as well as the number of the Army Unit (Jednostka wojskowa) was used on

addresses of parcels at that time. Correspondence mail has acquainted us with names like Poczta polowa 7708 (fieldpost 7708) and with individual Units like J.W. 2646 "Z", J.W. 3118 "G-1" and others. (see Fig. 2). Unit numbers always consisted of four numbers with letters from "A" to "Z", thus identifying the Unit, the Sub-Unit, the Staff, the Group and/or its place of origin. The domicile of all parcels was KLADSKO 3. From there, using its own transport, the Sorting Office in Hradec Králové collected its post from the KLADSKO 3 Post Office. The parcels were sorted in Hradec Králové and distributed to the appropriate Field Posts. By the same token, parcels from the Field Posts were sent back the other way around to KLADSKO, from where they were handed over to the civilian posts for delivery.

As far as correspondence between soldiers and formations within the framework of 2A was concerned, it was carried directly between Field Posts and occasionally by means of the post in Kladsko. It is known from documents that the number of the Field Post Sorting Office in Hradec Králové was 7708 while the Field Post that provided for the 11th Tank Division had the number 7705. Parcels consigned to the field were franked with stamps. At the beginning, even the soldiers' to their post homes was franked; later on it was free.

From preserved correspondence it can be definitively concluded that the system of postal service operated at 2A WP was of provisional character. So far no examples of a fieldpost daily canceller with date or appropriate fieldpost stationery has been found. The only known cancel is a rubber violet stamp "Poczta polowa 7708." Typical of the fieldpost is a discovered cancel "Wojskowe bezplatne" (Military, Porto free). Military cancellations appear in violet color, with the civilian ones being in black. (see Fig. 3)

In conclusion the author considers that there is still a great deal of information missing and that there is also an insufficiency of postally used material for study. That is why he is asking for help from other philatelists. Though all this concerns an extremely sensitive political situation which affected post-war Czechoslovakia, from the philatelic point of view it is also very



interesting. Even if there is only a very small possibility that a collector might run across mailed parcels from those days, it is vital that their existence be reported.

## PRAGA MUSICOPOLIS EUROPEA (PRAGUE - THE MUSICAL CITY)

### Part I - The Tyl Theater

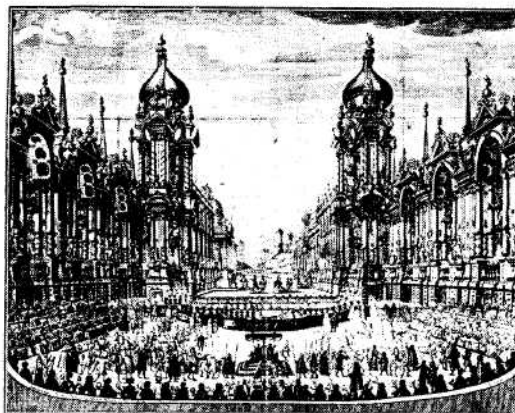
*(Editor's Note - This is the first in a series of articles in which the author discusses the historical significance of those buildings in Prague in which music has been performed and which have appeared on stamps of Czechoslovakia over the years).*

One of the most elaborate opera performances in Europe was staged for the coronation of Charles VI as King of Bohemia in 1723. It was the lavish production of the coronation opera *COSTANZA E FORTEZZA* by Johann Josef Fux (1660-1741). It took place in an open-air amphitheater on a terrace below Prague Castle in the presence of some 4,000 guests (see Fig. 1). The performance lasted close to five hours and ended at 1 AM. It concluded with Jan Dismas Zelenka's huge vocal-instrumental work, *SUB OLEA PACIS ET PALMA VIRTUTIS*. (The revival of Zelenka's compositions has been the rage in the past few years). As there were no theaters then, most operas were performed at the homes of members of the aristocracy.

Since 1723, Italian operas were performed in a specially constructed theater at the Quensternberg estate in Jaroměřice nad Rokytnou in Moravia on certain occasions each year. A travelling opera company of that period used the Estates Riding School in Brno but after 1732, operas were given in a newly erected theater in the Vegetable Market Square in Brno. A superb 18th century theater still stands in Český Krumlov with all its stage machinery and paraphernalia intact.

The first mention of a theater in Prague came in the year 1724 when, on Aug. 15, a Company of 23, including singers and dancers, performed a version of *ORLANDO FURIOSO* at Sporck's Theater, thus marking the beginnings of public opera in Prague.

From 1739 on, operas could be played at the Nuovo teatro della comunità della Reale Città Vecchia di Praga nel loco detto Kotzen or, more simply, the Kotzen Opera and Comedy House, built at a cost of 15,000 zlatniks (the Czech term for the Austrian Gulden). The "Kotzen" were the booths of a medieval woolen-cloth market established in 1377. The long

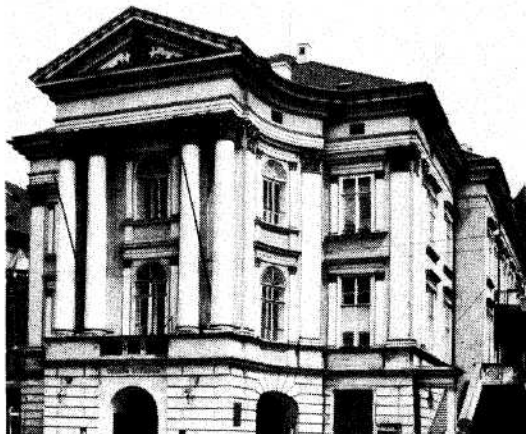

narrow upper hall was adapted for that purpose. It had a fairly deep stage, subdivided stalls, forty boxes in two tiers as well as a gallery. It remained the chief public theater of Prague until the opening of two new theaters in the 1780's. After 1783 it served as a theater storehouse.

In 1781, Count Franz Anton von Nostitz-Rhineck (1725-1791) began construction on a new theater in the Staré Město (Old Town) opposite the Karolinum. It was built at his own expense for 100,000 zlatniks between 1781 and 1783. The theater, with its two tiers of boxes, stalls divided into a "parteere noble" and a second parterre along with a gallery with benches and standing room and with a seating capacity of well over 1,000, was one of the finest theaters in Central Europe in the 18th century. It opened on April 12, 1783 with Lessing's tragedy *EMILIA GALOTTI*.

On October 29, 1787, the theater was the scene of the triumphant first performance of Mozart's *DON GIOVANNI*. Mozart himself conducted the house orchestra. This event is commemorated by a tablet on the left side of the theater entrance. A 1.60kčs stamp from a set of six artistically designed stamps issued for the 1956 Prague Music Festival and the 200th

anniversary of the birth of W.A. Mozart on Jan. 27, 1756 is shown in fig. 2. (Scott No. 755) The Tyl Theater as it appears on the stamp is described as the Nosticovo Divadlo. The theater was renamed Královské divadlo or the Royal Theater of the Estates (Königliches Ständestheater) when Count Nostitz's son sold it to the Bohemian Estates in 1789. From 1813 to 1816, Carl Maria von Weber (1786-1826) was its music director. In 1861 it was renamed Královské zemské divadlo or the Royal Provincial Theater (Königliches Landestheater). Finally in 1945 it was renamed the Tyl Theater in honor of the 19th century Czech dramatist, writer, producer and theater director, Josef Kateján Tyl (1808-1856).

Other important events connected with the Tyl Theater are: the first performance in 1827 of the Czech opera DRÁTENÍK (The Tinkerer) by František Škroup (1801-1862) (see Fig. 3); the premiere of the Czech comedy TIDLOVIČKA (The Fiddler's Feast) by J. K. Tyl in 1834; the song KDE DOMOV MUJ ? (Where is My Home?) which subsequently became the first part of the country's national anthem. Though Škroup composed the music, Tyl wrote the text. (see Fig. 4).

Rebuilt in 1902, the Tyl Theater cost 181 million crowns for its reconstruction in the early 1980's and is now one of the most modern theaters in the Czech Republic, seating more than 500 spectators under optimal visual and audible conditions. (see fig. 5). Interestingly enough, there is one other theater in the Czech Republic bearing the same name. It is located in the city of Plzeň (Pilsen). When Tyl died in 1956, a statue of him was erected in front of Prague's Tyl Theater.

## PHYSICIANS ON CZECHOSLOVAK STAMPS

A number of physicians have been commemorated on postal issues of the former Czechoslovakia, the most outstanding being Jan Evangelista Purkyně or Purkinje. Born at Libochovice in Bohemia, he graduated at Prague in 1819. Through his friendship with Goethe he was appointed a professor at Breslau University; he later became Professor of Physiology at the University of Prague. He introduced new techniques in microscopy and eponyms include Purkyně Fibres of heart muscles and Purkyně cells of the brain. An ardent nationalist, he changed his name from Purkinje to the Czech spelling. Being a personal friend of the poet Goethe, Purkyně translated his poems into the Czech language. His portrait appears on a pair of stamps from 1937 and a special cancellation from his birthplace, Libochovice, 28th September, 1937. (see Fig. 1, Scott no. ).

Sigmund Freud ( 1856-1939) is world renowned as the founder of psychoanalysis. He was born at Příbor in Moravia, later moving to Vienna with his parents. He graduated in medicine in 1881 and became attached to a neurological clinic. After becoming Associate Professor, he worked for a year with Jean-Martin Charcot at the Salpêtrière Hospital in Paris. The 30th anniversary of Freud's death was honored on the 10th October, 1969 by a special cancellation from his birthplace, Příbor.

Another physician was Ignac Pešina (1766-1808), born 21st May, 1766 at Kostelec nad Orlicí. He graduated in medicine from Vienna and in 1798 was appointed Professor of Anatomy at the Veterinary Institute where he later became its Director. He introduced vaccination against small-pox and researched into cattle-plague. The 200th anniversary of his birth was celebrated with a 30h stamp and special cancellations from Brno and Kostelec. (see Fig. 2, Scott no. 1363).

Branly was portrayed on one of the set of "Radio Pioneers" (the 35h value on 7th December, 1959. (see Fig. 3, Scott no. 951).

Anton Pavelich Chechov was born at Taganrog on the Sea of Axov in 1860 and died of consumption at Badenweiler, Germany, in 1904, so he can have little claim to be called a Czech.

None the less, he has been commemorated as a great writer and dramatist on two Czechoslovak stamps of 1954 (See Fig. 4, Scott no. 663). Chechov graduated in medicine from Moscow University in 1885 and practised for a few years. He wrote, "Medicine is my lawful wife but, at any rate, it is not boring and neither of them loses anything for my infidelity."

Emil Holub (1847-1902) was born at Holitz, Bohemia, later studying medicine at the University of Prague. In 1872 he joined an expedition to the Kimberley diamond fields as a surgeon and devoted himself thereafter to the exploration of Africa. Together with his wife, Holub attempted to cross Africa from Capetown to the Egyptian border between 1883 and 1887 but failed because of the natives' hostility. He returned to Vienna in 1887 with a collection of over 13,000 specimens of scientific and natural historic value. Among his books were: 'Seven Years in South Africa', 'The Second Journey' and 'From Capetown to the Land of the Mashuculumb'. A pair of Czechoslovak stamps of 1952 recall the 50th anniversary of Holub's death and a slogan cancellation from Holic (Holitz) on 7th October, 1947 honours the centenary of Holub's birth. (See Fig. 5, Scott Nos. 499 + 500).

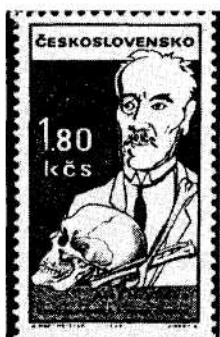

Aleš Hrdlička (1869-1943) was born at Humpolec, Bohemia, and emigrated to America with his parents in 1882. He graduated in medicine in 1894, leaving shortly afterward for Paris to devote the rest of his life to the study of anthropology. He founded the American Anthropological Journal and wrote more than 300 original papers on that subject. He was portrayed in caricature on a 1.80 Kčs stamp of 1969; his centenary was marked by a special cancellation from Humpolec on 5th September, 1969. (see Fig. 6, Scott No. 1632).

The novelist, best-known as 'Martin Kukučín' was born Matej Bencur in Jasenovo, Slovakia, on 17th May, 1870. He graduated in medicine from Prague in 1893 and first practised on the Isle of Brač in Croatia. In 1908 he moved to Punta Arenas, Argentina - the most southerly city in the world. He returned to Czechoslovakia in 1922 and acquired fame by his stories 'The Red Heifer', 'The Unawakened' and 'The House on The Hill'. He died at Lipik, Yugoslavia on 21st May, 1928. He appears (as a

poet) on a 1 Kčs stamp of 1953 (see Fig. 7, Scott no. 571).

An army surgeon, Miroslav Novák, born at Litomyšl, Bohemia, on 5th May 1907, was honored as a War Hero by his portrait on a 1.50Kčs stamp of 1945. He graduated from Charles University, Prague in 1931 and practised as an ear, nose and throat surgeon until the Nazis invaded his country in 1939. He escaped to England, via Syria and France, to join the Czechoslovak Army as an Air Force Medical Officer. Miroslav Novák was killed in a motor accident in London on 7th January 1945. (see Fig. 8, Scott Nos. 273 + 281).

The patriotic martyr Vladislav Vančura (1891-1942), was born in Moravia of an old Czech literary family. He graduated in medicine from Brunn (Brno) University in 1915. However, instead of practising, he devoted himself to literature, becoming distinguished as novelist and dramatist. Following the Nazi occupation in 1939, Vančura joined the underground resistance but was eventually arrested and executed as a hostage on 1st June, 1942. He was honored (as a poet) on an 80h stamp of 1949. A painting by František Muzika in 1944, entitled 'The Great Requiem' (commemorating the death of his friend Vančura), is reproduced as the 60h stamp in the "Art on Stamps" issue of 1969. (see Fig. 9, Scott no. 375).

The Russian ophthalmologist, Luwig Lazarus Zamenhoff (1859-1917), has been honored by having a street named after him in Lázně Bělohrad - "Alej dra Dr. Zamenhoff". The street is portrayed on post-cards of 1937 and 1938. In 1887, he published the elements and rules of a new international language which he called 'Esperanto'. Zamenhoff is commemorated on stamps from a number of countries in 1987 on the centenary of the publication of his work.

The physician Gustav Karel Zechenter (1824-1908) was born at Banská Bystrica, Slovakia, studied under Josef Škoda in Budapest and Vienna, graduating in 1850. He first practised in Brezno but because of his liberal opinions, was transferred to Krimnitz in Slovakia to practise medicine among poor factory and mine workers. Under the nom-de-plume of Laskonienský, he wrote humoresque, folklore and travel sketches. His portrait appears on a stamp of 1958. (see Fig. 10, Scott No. 847).

The Russian cosmonaut Komarov and the crew of Soyuz-II are portrayed on a Czechoslovak 3Kčs stamp of 1973. (see Fig. 11, Scott no. 1878). One of them is Boris Orisovich Yegorov, born Moscow, 1937, the son of a famous neuro-surgeon. Boris graduated in Moscow in 1951 and devoted himself to aviation- and space-medicine. As a lieutenant in the USSR Army Medical Corps, he became the first physician to be launched into space - orbiting the earth sixteen times. No other physician portrayed on any Czechoslovak stamp has travelled as far! The flight was commemorated also by a special cancellation from Prague on 13th October, 1964 that reads - "V.M. Komarov, K.P. Feokistov, B.B. Jegorov, Space craft Voschod, Oct. 12-13".

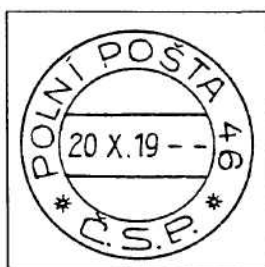

The Czechoslovak army conducted defensive operations in Slovakia during June 1919 and progressively retreated under the pressure of the Hungarian Republican Army. On June 6, 1919, the Hungarian army occupied Košice and in the following days reached Bardejov. A Slovak National Council was declared on June 16, 1919 in Prešov. Units of the Czechoslovak Army on armed alert status were stationed in the area from Western Slovakia all the way to Užhorod and were under the command of French General Destremeau. The military unit designated as the Carpathian Group was comprised of two (2) incomplete brigades; the 1st Brigade of the 1st Division and the 5th Brigade of the 3rd Division. Following the occupation of Košice and the disruption of rail connections in Sub-Carpathian Russia, the Carpathian Group lost communications with the command of the main force of the Czechoslovak army in Eastern Slovakia which had moved to the area around Spišská Nová Ves. This reality required substitute mail delivery by air between Užhorod and Spišská Nová Ves in June 1919. Details of this service were presented on the pages of Filatelie (Matějka, 1968; Tekel, 1985).

Field Post 46 was based in Užhorod in June 1919 and serviced the postal needs of the 3rd Infantry Division. After the cutting off of the Carpathian Group, this field post also serviced most of the

remaining units of the Czechoslovak Army in the Užhorod area. This field post used two different cancelers:

- 1) bearing the text ČESKOSLOVANSKÁ POLNÍ POŠTA \*46\* (27.5 mm) (Fig. 1)
- 2) bearing the text POLNÍ POŠTA 46 Č.S.P. (30 mm) (Fig. 2)

Impressions of both cancelers are most commonly found in black, but more rarely also in blue ink. Use of the blue ink, sometimes with a blue-green hue, was limited in time to June/July of 1919. We find the reason for the substitute color to be the acute shortage of standard black ink needed for cancellation of daily mail at Field Post 46. The shortage of such supplies was caused by the very unfavorable strategic situation. From the collector's point of view, it is significant to note that our preliminary conclusions, based on the study of available covers, set the appearance of the blue cancellation with the ČESKOSLOVANSKÁ POLNÍ POŠTA \*46\* text during the period from June 16 to July 31, 1919 (Figure 3). This 45 day period during which the blue cancellation appeared deserves the collector's attention. The blue cancellation with the text POLNÍ POŠTA 46 Č.S.P. is known only with the date 3. VII. 19. It is understandable that we can find the blue cancellation of Field Post 46 on mail despatched by troops of the 3rd, 28th, and 36th regiments, the 2nd Company, 21st Infantry Regiment of the French Legions as well as other independent units which comprised the Carpathian Group. Covers bearing the blue Field Post 46 cancellation are welcome additions to collections of Field Post mail or collections of mail of the Sub-Carpathian Russia during the 1919 period.

## TWO INTERESTING 1945 COVERS

Recently I was fortunate in obtaining a bundle of covers addressed to a member of the Czechoslovak Armed Forces in Great Britain. Their origin dates from as early as June 1943 in

Teheran, Persia (Iran) through 1944 in England and via the "Active Service Post" from the Dunkirk enclave in France. Among them were a few 1945 covers addressed to places in liberated Western Bohemia. Two of these are of particular interest in their own right but, when considered in combination, are of even greater interest.

Figure 1 shows a cover addressed to Mr. Jan Jaluvka, Liaison Officer to the USA Army, Františková Lázně, Bohemia. The sender was Mrs. Žofie Schilderová, Kopřivnice no. 75, Moravia. The letter was registered in Kopřivnice, using the provisional registration label R28 and stamped with the Kopřivnice town name in red. The postage came to 4.20 kčs, which was the correct rate for a registered letter of less than 20 grams in weight. The stamps were cancelled with the provisional double circle "Kopřivnice" postmark in blue, giving the year date only.

Up to August 1945, Františková Lázně (near Cheb in Western Bohemia) was the location of the USA 79th Infantry Division, which was served by APO 79 up to August 9, 1945. The letter was then redirected to the 16th Armored Division on June 5 (see redirection mark "16 ARMD 6-5" in middle top of cover). The "Z9" marking was probably used as an identification mark of the APO 79 personnel. The 16th Armored Division was located at Planá u Tachova from May to September 1945 and was served by USA APO 412 from May 16, 1945 to Oct. 4, 1945.

Figure 2 shows a cover addressed to Jan Jaluvka, Liaison Officer to the USA Army, Hotel Weimar, Mariánské Lázně. The sender was Olga Huberňátková, Kopřivnice 75. The letter was registered at Kopřivnice, using the provisional registration label R345 and handstamped with the Kopřivnice town name in blue. It also has the Portectorate Express bi-lingual label. The postage came to 8.20Kčs which is the correct rate for a Registered Express letter under 20 grams in weight. The stamps were cancelled, using the provisional double circle "Kopřivnice" postmark in black. The date of posting was November 12, i.e. date mark 12.XI

in pencil; the significance of the penciled number "4" on the front of the cover is not known. From the date and destination of the cover, Jan Jaluvka would have been attached to the USA 80th Infantry Division, which was located in Mariánské Lázně at that time and was served by APO 80 from Sept. 25, 1945, the APO itself being closed in April 1946.

Jan Jaluvka was a member of the Czechoslovak Forces in Great Britain. Most of the covers in my possession are addressed to him, using a rank of Senior Lieutenant, at a private address in Gateshead, England. A cover addressed to Mrs. Muriel Jaluvka, Gateshead, and dated 10 Dec. 1944 using the Czechoslovak Army Field Post type 5, code A regular handstamp, was marked "on active service" by hand in the top right corner. It also had the British Censor cachet No. 11689 on the front. No. 11689 was allocated to Czechoslovak Independent Armored Brigade No. 1 Tank Battalion, which was involved in the action at Dunkirk during the invasion of Europe.

Whether Lt. Jan Jaluvka was one of the small number of men that comprised the Czechoslovak Forces contingent attached to the USA Forces which were involved in the liberation of Western Bohemia on the 1st of May 1945 near Cheb, or was part of the Czechoslovak Armored Brigade that entered Czechoslovakia on the 18th of May 1945, I do not know. Any additional information would be most welcome.

the 1500's. This was a large and ornate silver coin which was recognized as valid currency throughout Europe in its day. Its name, Thaler, is the forerunner of our term, Dollar. This lovely and attractive keepsake was donated by our European member, Dr. Walter Rauch. Thank you Dr. Rauch for thinking of us.

An extremely pleasant surprise occurred when the daughter, Judith Bar Nadav, of former co-founder of the Society, Joseph W. Lowey, appeared at our table. She presented the Society with some material that she had come across that were left to her by her father. At least two of the items will become permanent parts of the Society's display at conventions. One is a mounted letter from the Aide to General Eisenhower along with a Czechoslovak post card addressed to Lowey commemorating the visit of General Eisenhower to Prague on October 11, 1945. There is a special commemorative cancel and the card is signed by General Eisenhower. The second is a FDC of the 5c "Toward United Nations April 25, 1945" addressed to Lowey and signed by Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk and other Czechoslovak representatives. It is mounted along with a top-block of 20 of the commemorative stamp. There are still more items, some of which will become part of our permanent archives while others will be placed in the circuit, so watch for them. Thank you, Judith, for your thoughtfulness.

Leaving the best for last, we had an absolutely mesmerizing slide and cover presentation by our guest speaker from England, W. Alec Page, on WW II Exile Forces Mail. His talk and show made it very clear to the audience that there is a relatively untapped well of investigative opportunity. He informed us that he is constantly finding new material wherever he goes - especially with respect to material relating to the Czechoslovak units in France both before the German occupation and thereafter. An unexpected bonus materialized for attendees of the presentation when Czech-born impressionistic painter, Kamil Kubik, showed up and signed World Cup Soccer Stamps, 1st Day Issue Souvenir Cards. The significance here is that Kamil Kubik was the illustrator of the Giants Stadium soccer game on the card. To give you a feel for Mr. Kubik's notoriety, he did the official White House Christmas cards for 1991 and 1992.

### **PUBLICATION**

Speaking of winning awards, the track record of our SPECIALIST continues to be an enviable one. Our next-to-last award for 1993 came from a distant source. In September 1993, our journal was awarded a Vermeil medal by WAPEX 93 (Philatelic Society of Western Australia Inc.), thanks to the efforts of our assistant editor, Gerald van Zanten. Following that, on Nov. 13, 1993, we received a Silver medal from CHICAGOPEX.

In 1994, your editor submitted the SPECIALIST for competition at COLOPEX (Columbus, Ohio), the Cardinal Spellman Philatelic Museum and STAMPSHOW 94 (Pittsburgh, Pa). From COLOPEX we received a Vermeil and the first and only written critique our publication was given in the six years that Mirko Vondra has been editor. The last two have yet to be heard from. STAMPSHOW will not take place until August 18. It is the COLOPEX critique that your editor wants to impart to our membership for consideration and comments.

The COLOPEX jury liked the depth and scope of our publication and felt its contents contributed to the growth of philately. It found the editing and proofing satisfactory and was particularly impressed with our Table of Contents appearing on the front page.

We were downgraded for lack of uniformity of our illustrations, for failing to put borders around our covers and for failing to caption our photos so they coincide with the text. Regarding lack of uniformity, you editor agrees. This is a distinct problem. Those writers who submit articles accompanied by original material for illustration or, where that is impractical, by glossy black-and-white photos will find the reproduction of their illustrations to be beautiful. Those writers who only submit photocopies, especially copies that are over-or under-exposed or that are generally unclear because of worn copy material will find their published illustrations to be fuzzy and of inferior quality.

We were further downgraded for what the jury felt was poor quality of printing resulting in poor readability. Your editor would like to hear from our members on this particular criticism.



Finally, the following text is being quoted exactly as it appeared in the resume of the jury's verdict:

"The jury liked the format of Journal; the column for novices and the new listing is a good idea. The editorials were another matter; some of the language, explanations were not scholarly but were at least not disguised as a 'news story' or an 'article'. The quality of the printing was variable. An annual index would be a good addition in future issues. Overall, the strength of this journal is in the content of the articles and the jury felt it serves the membership very well."

Since the SPECIALIST is published not so much for the purpose of receiving awards as it is for imparting valuable philatelic knowledge and information to its membership-at-large, your editor would appreciate a feedback. 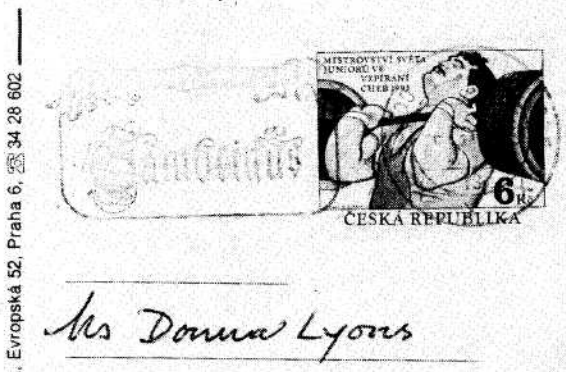

The cancellation, dated 25-11-93, Praha, reads in large fracture-like letters: "Gambrinus", which my friend tells me is a new kind of beer. Above the Gambrinus I can make out "Plzenske" and "Pivovary" indicating "Pilsner" and "brewery", I believe. Although this is not a first-day cover or one issued for an historical event, I thought that you might be interested in it nonetheless since the stamp appears to be a companion issue of the 3Kc illustrated in your journal (see Fig. 1).

I read with interest, also, your listing of available publications. I am a teacher of Latin, and in one of my classics journals I came across an advertisement by one of the fine publishers of classical scholarship. Bolchazy-Carducci has just recently reprinted Dr. Jan Simko's English-Slovak Dictionary which has been out of print for nearly twenty years. Perhaps some of your members would appreciate knowing about the availability of this recent reprint. I am including a copy of the advertisement from Bolchazy-Carducci Publishers which describes the particulars of this edition. Dear Fellow Editor,

I have been accused of being a total bore when it comes to writing about my home town of Telč. I don't know why, since Telč is clearly the most important town in Moravia. But once again, I can't resist.

On May 18th, the Ministry of Economy of the Czech Republic has issued a commemorative stamp featuring Telč. The Czechoslovak Republic had issued two stamps devoted to Telč earlier, since it is well known that Telč is the most beautifully preserved baroque town in all of the Czech Republic, and is generally referred to as the "Pearl of Moravia".

The most recent stamp has been issued on occasion of last year's listing of Telč by UNESCO as a "WORLD NATIONAL AND CULTURAL HERITAGE", - the ONLY Moravian town thus honored.....

The design of the stamp is significantly better than those of the two earlier stamps. The engraving shows the lovely detail of the baroque facades of the four houses, which could not have been captured had the artist tried to show the entire plaza. The plaza probably includes over ten times as many houses, most of them now restored to their 15th and 16th century splendor.

For those who would like to see the "real thing", there will be a one-day excursion to Telč by participants in the SVU (Society for Arts and Sciences) Congress, scheduled to take place in Prague beginning June 26th. Dear Editor:

You will recall that my article on the National Postal Museum in the March-April issue described and illustrated the Museum's exhibit depicting the four stamps of the second Bohemia-Moravia Protectorate issue which join together to compose a map of pre-Munich Czechoslovakia.

A fellow SCP member, Lubor Kunc of Prague, has drawn my attention to another possible example of postal political protest during the occupation. The 1940 semi-postal Red Cross issue, he points out, shows a nurse and a standing, fully uniformed German soldier with his left arm in a sling but otherwise evidently healthy. The 1941 issue depicts a nurse attending a German soldier clad in pajamas and lying in a hospital bed. In 1942 a now visibly ill soldier makes his final appearance, recumbent in a mass of pillows and blankets, his heavily bandaged head supported by a nurse holding a glass to his mouth. The stamps parallel the changing fortunes of the Wehrmacht from the fall of France to the invasion of Russia to the beginning of the Russian counter-offensive and Rommel's defeat at El Alamein. As Mr. Kunc writes, "The people said they showed the situation of the German Army in WW II. In 1940 they won all battles; in 1942 they started to lose all battles." . . .

In addition to the above, I would like to suggest that a knowledgeable member write one or two comprehensive articles on the 1938 Sudetenland issues and the 1945 post-liberation overprints. The last such articles appeared in your publication over twenty years ago and are inaccessible to most members.

Dear Mr. Vondra:

In response to Frank Garancovsky's interesting article in the Mar/Apr SPECIALIST, I wish to inform you about the booklets issued in the Czech Republic in 1993.

Czech Postal Services have issued a total of 14 various booklets to date. Seven different stamps were used in those booklets. The most popular of those is the Český Krumlov stamp with a face value of 3 Kč issued as part of the "Towns" series (see Fig. 2).

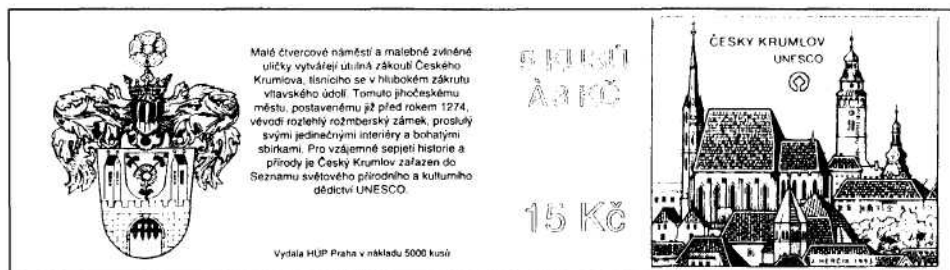

A booklet commemorating figure skating championships was the first to be issued in the Czech Republic. The second booklet includes a stamp on "small arms." Only 5,000 pieces were printed. This was followed by a booklet honoring President Václav Havel, also printed in a quantity of 5,000. This stamp has been used in a subsequent booklet bearing a picture of Old Prague. The press run of this one was 100,00 pieces.

The Postal Service used the former stamps of "Towns" for further booklets. The first showed Český Krumlov and was issued with the old cover showing the same price in

Czechoslovak crowns (3 kčs.) as the succeeding booklet showed in Czech crowns (3kč.). Other "Towns" stamps in that set include České Budějovice (one booklet - 1 kč. - see fig. 3); Ústí nad Labem (two booklets - 2 kč.); and Plzeň (one booklet - 5 kč. - see fig. 4).

Some of the above booklets have been issued in press runs of 5,000 pieces with the cover of most issues bearing the town's coat of arms on the back of the cover. Why our Postal Service issued the booklets in initial press runs of 5,000 and then reprinted them in press runs of 300,000 is something I cannot explain.

## New Issues

### CZECH REPUBLIC

1. On March 30, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued a stamp in its series on City Architecture. It is a 3kc stamp showing the courtyard of the Moravian Land Museum in Brno with St. Peter and St. Paul Cathedral of Petrov in the background. (see Fig. 1)

The stamp was designed by academic painter and graphic artist Jiří Bouda and engraved by Bohumil Šneider. The stamp was printed by rotary recess print combined with photogravure in blue and red and the picture is 19 x 23 mm. in size. It was produced at the Post Printery in Prague in sheets of 100.

2. On May 4, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued two stamps commemorating the 740th anniversary of the birth of Marco Polo. Pictured on it are drawings of land and water creatures presumed to be contemporary of the Marco Polo era along with a male traveler done in the style of a caricature. Each stamp is inscribed with "ČESKÁ REPUBLIKA", "1254-1324 Marco POLO" and the denomination "14 kč".

The stamps were designed by graphic artist and academic painter Adolf Born and engraved by Miloš Ondráček. The stamps were printed alternately in checkerboard style at the Post Printery in Prague by five-colored flat recess print in black, blue, green, brown and red in sheetlets of four. Each stamp is 26 x 40 mm. in size. (see Fig. 2).

There is a separate first day cover with special cancellation for each stamp. These were printed by recess print from flat plates in black and ochre; one has a drawing of an archer on a horse; the other a drawing of a small dragon with a sailing boat and a sailor.

3. On May 4, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued an envelope with an inprinted 3kč stamp designed by Jiří Švengsbir. It is the same design as was employed on the 2kč commemorative stamp issued on the occasion of the national exhibition PRAHA 1950 and depicting the oldest known view of Prague. It is a reproduction of a woodcut made by Michael Wohlegemuth in 1493 appearing in the book of H. Schedel, *LIBER CHRONICARUM*.

The stamp imprint is 34 x 21 mm. in size and appears in black. Its selling price is listed as 4.00 Kč.

4. On May 18, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued a stamp commemorating the 110th anniversary of the birth of Dr. Eduard Benes, Minister of Foreign Affairs (1918-1935), Prime Minister (1921-1922) and President of the Czechoslovak Republic (1935-1938; 1945-1948). The stamp bears a portrait of the statesman along with the text "Eduard Benes 1884-1948". (see Fig. 3).

Designed and engraved by graphic artist Vaclav Fajt, the stamp has a size of 23 x 30 mm. and was printed by the Post Printery in Prague by rotary recess print in grey-blue combined with photogravure in violet.

Accompanying the stamp is a first-day cover with special cancellation printed by recess print from flat plates in light brown. The cachet on the cover bears his signature with lime leaves.

5. The Ministry of Economy issued two stamps on May 18, 1994 honoring World National and Cultural Heritage under the patronage of UNESCO. The first is an 8kc stamp showing baroque gables of a row of houses.

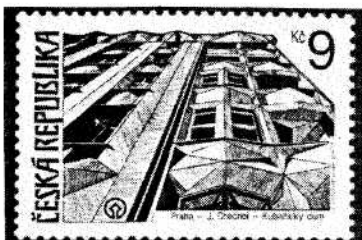

inscription "Dětem" (To children) in Czech. (see Fig. 6). Designed by academic painter and graphic artist Květa Pacovská and engraved by Václav Fajt, the stamp was printed by the Post Printery in Prague by rotary recess print in black color combined with four-colored photogravure in yellow, red, green and rose. The stamp appears in a size of 23x30mm. and is printed in sheets of 50.

Accompanying it is a first-day cover with special cancellation printed by recess print from flat plates in black and red. The cachet portion bears a drawing of a figure with space for chil-

es in Telč with the text "UNESCO - Barokni stity domu na náměstí." It was designed by Pavel Hrách and engraved by Václav Fajt and appears in yellow, red blue, brown and black colors. The second is a 9kc stamp showing a cubistic style of architecture on a building designed by Josef Chochola. Graphic design of the stamp was by Zdeněk Ziegler and engraving by Bohumil Šneider. It appears in ochre, grey, grey-blue, black and brownish red colors. (see Fig. 4a and 4b).

Each stamp is 40 x 26 mm in size and was printed by the Post Printery in Prague in sheetlets of 8 by recess print from flat plates.

There is a separate first-day cover for each stamp with a special cancellation printed by recess print from flat plates. The cover for the 8kc stamp bears a drawing of part of a column of the Telč Town Hall in grey-black as its cachet. The cover for the 9kc shows part of the project of the monumental interior from 1912 by the architect Pavel Janák in black and brown.

6. Jurassic Park has finally arrived at the Czech Republic. On June 1, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued three stamps depicting dinosaurs based on original paintings found in the Gallery of Z. Burian in Dvůr Králové (the 2 Kč and 3kč) and in Anthropos Moravian Museum in Brno (the 5kč). The three stamps were designed by graphic artist Oldřich Pošmurný and printed by Victoria Security Printing in Prague by five-colored offset in sheets of 50. The first two denominations are in 40 x 23 mm. size while the 5kč is in 23 x 40 mm. size. (see fig. 5a, 5b and 5c).

Accompanying the stamps are two First Day covers with special cancellation printed by recess print from flat plates employing Zdenek Burian's pen-and-ink drawings and engraved by Martin Srb. The cover for the first two denominations bears a drawing of Ceratosaurus Nasicornis in dark green color. The last denomination has a picture of Triseratops in brown color.

7. Since Jurassic Park is chiefly a children's theme, the Ministry of Economy chose the subject of Children for its next issue. On June 1, 1994, it released a commemorative stamp honoring Children with a picture comprising an interpretive sketch of drawing pencils and the

dren's graphic creations.

8. On June 1, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued a stamp publicizing the World Soccer championships at the United States in 1994. The picture shows a soccer ball passing in front of the Statue of Liberty. This is an 8kč stamp with Czech text in the upper right corner reading "MS ve footbale - USA 1994" (World Soccer Football Championship, etc.). Designed by academic painter and graphic artist Ivan Strnad and engraved by Josef Herčík, the stamp was printed by the Post Printery in Prague by rotary recess print in dark blue color combined with three-colored photogravure in yellow, red and blue. The stamp size is 30 x 23 mm. and comes in sheets of 50. (see Fig. 7).

Accompanying it is a first-day cover with special cancellation printed by recess print from flat plates in dark blue and contains a drawing of a goalie in action.

9. On June 15, 1994, the Ministry of Economy issued a stamp commemorating the 100th anniversary of the International Olympic Committee. The picture shows the Olympic flag passing in front of the Olympic torch and flame with birds flying in the background and Czech text in the lower left corner reading: "100 let mezinárodního olympického výboru" (100 Years of the International Olympic Committee). This is a 7kč stamp of 23x40 mm. size printed by the Post Printery in Prague by rotary recess print in black color combined with four-colored photogravure in yellow, dark blue, green and red in sheets of 50. (see Fig. 8). It was designed by academic painter and graphic artist Jaroslav Fišer and engraved by Martin Srb.

There is a first-day cover with special cancellation printed by recess print from flat plates. The cachet bears a drawing of the globe with olympic circles in black and blue.

All of the above-mentioned stamps are postally valid for both domestic and international use from the date of issue until officially withdrawn from circulation.
