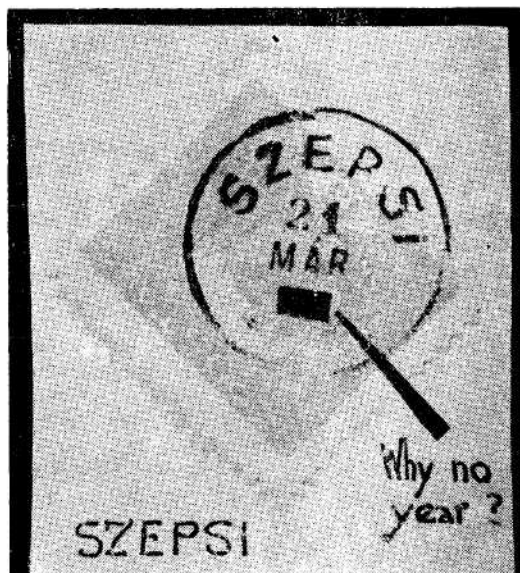

Stumped On Stamps? ? ?

A devoted student of Hradecany and winner of the 1972 Lowey Award, Tom Austin of Costa Rica has sent us some interesting 5h green "mysteries" some of which we may—at least in part—have solved. Here are a few:



Cancel SZEPSI shows the Hungarian order starting on top with YEAR, then MONTH and DAY at the bottom. At the time, Czechoslovak postal clerks were changing the order to that used in Bohemia and Moravia, nameiy DAY—MONTH—YEAR. Is "21" the day or year. It could be either, since the stamp was still in use in 1921. Was the canceling device set by a Czechoslovak-thinking clerk or an old Hungarian employee clinging to the old order? Why was the bottom number blackened?

Figure 2 shows the cancel PRAHA 20 with the year blocked out. Why? This item is similar to the above. The year is NOT blocked out, but the hour of acceptance is. We do not know the reason, but for the record, the usual Austrian cancelations have the following order:

 YEAR (Arabic) last two digits only.

Figure 3—right shows cancel with "4" in front of the place name. We have never seen a number in front of the name in Czechoslovakia. Only a few names (German) begin with "W" in towns of Czechoslovakia after 1918, and all of them are too small to have more than one post office. For all we know it might be WIEN (Vienna), cancelled to order, possibly later. It is impossible to ascertain just what this may be without the help of an expert on Austrian and/or German cancels.

Fig. 3—left—shows a light lilac overprint. What is it? We believe this overprint to be part of "ZENSUR," i.e. censorship in German. It might be an old Austrian rubber stamp of WW I origin used by Czechoslovak authorities on mail to foreign countries (Germany, Austria, Hungary) or proper German or Austrian censorship of incoming mail from the Czechoslovak Republic. Usually the censorship markings were not on the stamps, but in this case the letter could have been covered with stamps (5h is a very low denomi-

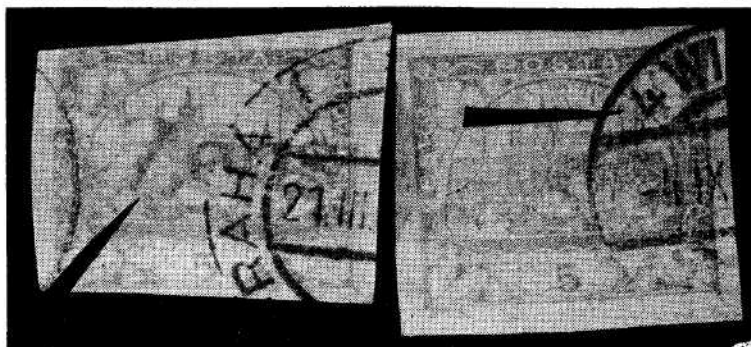

ination) and there was no place left for the censor to use; or the clerk was just sloppy.

The fourth 5h Hradcany item sent by Tom Austin (not illustrated) shows a white area or washout caused by a foreign particle on the printing plate (probably a shred of paper) which absorbed most of the dye and fell off. The part of the design was thus inadequately inked, causing the lighter washed-out spot. This will be true for most of your "foggy spots." Dark spots are the initial print of the inked foreign particle, usually with white outline. The thickness of the particle pressed the paper receiving the print away from the plate. Normally this is considered printers waste, but at the time of printing the Hradcany stamps, the control was not so strict. Due to pressure of time, even more severe faults reached post offices—or were taken out of the printing plant illegally — some were even sold officially to the Czechoslovak Philatelic Club when members complained that so much waste was finding its way out of the print shop to dealers' stocks.

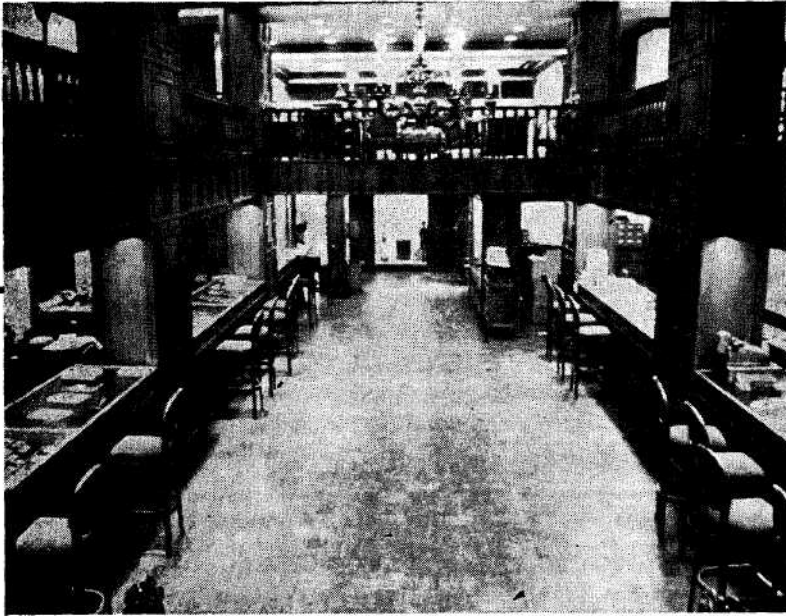

Society's 1974 Convention and Exhibition To Be Held At COMPLEX

Chicago, Ill.—The Society for Czechoslovak Philately will hold its Bi-annual Convention and Exhibition on May 24, 25 and 26 in Chicago, Ill., in conjunction with COMPLEX '74. According to the SOCIETY'S Convention and Exhibition Chairman Charles Chesloe, the 1000 frame show will be located at Chicago's La Salle Hotel. Celebrating the Centennial of the Universal Postal Union, numerous societies will participate in what is to be a truly memorable Memorial Day week-end. Some 52 dealers are expected to provide a lively bourse, and at least four Governments, including the U.S., Canada, Sweden and the U.N. will be represented. The SOCIETY plans to have a table at which philatelic literature will be exhibited and sold. In addition, the SOCIETY will have a meeting room at the La Salle Hotel at which its Convention and other activities will take place.

The Czechoslovakia exhibits will be judged by a three-man panel of judges appointed by the President of the SOCIETY, Mirko L. Vondra. Further detailed announcements will be made in the next issue of the SPECIALIST.

Chicagoland Group To Become Branch Of The Society

As a final step in the reunification of the SOCIETY, which was torn by personal strife dating back nearly ten years, Dr. James J. Matejka Jr., Chairman of the Chicagoland Czechoslovak Philatelic Society has written the Editor of the SPECIALIST:

" . . . It looks though our group will join the SOCIETY at its annual meeting in May 1974, at the time of COMPLEX . . . "

In a subsequent telephone conversation with SOCIETY President Vondra, Dr. Matejka clarified the above statement, pointing out that his group will be a Branch of the SOCIETY prior to the SOCIETY'S Biannual Convention. The President expressed his appreciation of the fact that most members of the Chicagoland group, including its Chairman, are already members of the SOCIETY, and that the majority of the group have already expressed interest in restoration of the Branch status.

Credit for this welcome news is chiefly due to Board Members Mrs. Sterba, Charles Chesloe, Dr. Matejka and the many members, both in Chicago and the East, who have dug hard these past months to bury the hatchet.

Rádi bychom též slyšeli od našich nedávno přistěhovaných krajanů. Jistě je mezi nimi mnoho filatelistů. Pište nám též o Vašem klubovém životě, jak se kde ve světě čs. známky sbírají, vyměňují, kupují, získávají. Tyto česky a slovensky psané články budou jistě čteny a posuzovány v Československu, příběhy a historky o sbírání čs. známek v cizině je budou pravděpodobně zajímat alespoň tolik jako nás.

Je smutné, že v našem prvním článku se musíme zmínit o úmrtí muže, který se svým způsobem hodně zasloužil o čs. filatelii: tu někdy zanedbávanou a přezranou část, která pomáhá sběratelům v jejich podceňovaném, ale velmi důležitém úkolu: uskladňování a bezpečném přechovávání jejich miláčků-známeč. Pan Emil Stiburek, který se po mnohá desetiletí, a republiky, za druhé světové války a též po nějaký čas po r. 1945, staral o to, aby sběratele měli potřebná a vkusná známková alba, zemřel ve věku 71 let v Praze, 11. pros. 1973. Pro naši starší generaci je toto jméno spojeno nerozlučně s alby nejen ČSR, ale též s alby jiných zemí Evropy. Jeho inseráty byly pravidelně uveřejňovány v Čs. Filatelii, Merkuru, Tribuně Čs. Filatelistů a v mnoha jiných časopisech. A tak odešel z čs. filatelistického života opět jeden dobrý člověk, který se staral o potřeby čs. filatelistů po celém světě. Člověk odešel, jeho jméno však bude ještě dlouho žít v naší filatelii: Stiburkova alba budou ještě dlouho opatřovat ty naše drahoušky, ty krásné a ty ušmudlané, drahé a lacinoučké, velké, malé, svěží i razítkované. Člověk odešel. Budiz mu země lehká.

Charley's Corner

On July 15, 1939, the first series of the Protectorate appeared. Regular issues of Czechoslovakia were overprinted "Böhmen u. Mähren"---"Čechy a Morava".

Four very distinct varieties of the overprint exist. First, the 20h and 25h values exist without the "u." in the legend "Böhmen u. Mähren". The second variety also concerns the u. in the German text. The 1.20Kč, 2.50Kč and the 3Kč values exist without the period after the "u". Figure 1 shows

the normal overprint, while Figure 2 shows the period missing.

Perhaps the most popular and sought after variety appears in the 1.60Kč value. The German word "Mähren" is misspelled as "Mähnen", i.e. with a "n" instead of "r". This variety is illustrated in Fig. 3. I also had this variety se-tenant (pair with normal) but after careful examination found it to be a forgery.

The fourth variety, which in some catalogues is assigned the highest value

contains the damaged "B" in "Böhmen" on the 1.60Kč value. The damaged "B" gives the appearance of an "S," as shown in Fig. 4.

These varieties are in great demand, especially by German collectors and prices are quite high. When purchasing these items, be careful—I believe that many of them are or were being forged. Good hunting!

The 1974 "Parade"

The postal administration has released its schedule of new Czechoslovakia stamp issues. The plan is to have 18 issue dates of 21 sets containing a total of 59 different stamps available on 38 First Day Covers.

The rate of exchange for the year is \$1.00=Kčs 5.50. Using this rate, mint singles of the 1974 program add up to 72.20 Kčs or \$13.11 U. S.

It is also noted by ARTIA, "In the case of devaluation of the U. S. dollar the sums would be correspondingly increased."

Those Miniature Sheets of 4 and 10 of Czechoslovakia

I note in the philatelic press of the great interest shown in the collecting of miniature sheets, particularly those of Japan. However, I wonder how many collectors are aware that over 200 different miniature sheets have been issued by the Czechoslovak postal administration. The first miniature sheets to appear were of the 1951 airmail stamps. During the past 22 years over 200 of these miniature sheets have been issued by Czechoslovakia, these are not to be confused with the easily recognizable souvenir sheets (listed in Scott). For the most part these miniature sheets exist of the so-called "blocked" stamps of Czechoslovakia. This term is used to describe a certain stamp of a Czech set which has a very small printing in relation to other stamps in the set. However, the miniature sheets also exist in many cases for complete sets of stamps. Therefore, the person who collects these will have many complete sets of Czech stamps in the miniature sheets and others where only one or two stamps of the set will be in the miniature sheets.

Generally the miniature sheets do not carry marginal inscriptions. The major exception being the 1964 Tokyo Olympic set (all sheets of 10 have margins with inscriptions in Czech and Japanese) and some of the Art stamp sheets of 4 have inscriptions on a center tab in the sheet. Examples of these can be found in some of the special stamps for Praga 1968. The collector of these sheets will also find that the size of the stamp alone is not the determining factor as to whether the stamps will be found in a miniature sheet or not. The large size airmail stamps of 1955 were issued in sheets of 25 whereas the "small" size beautiful bird stamps of 1972 were issued in sheets of 10.

The collecting of miniature sheets offer a real challenge to those who want to collect them. This author has been collecting them for many years and still lacks several for completion. If one takes into consideration the large number of stamps used for cancelled-to-order purposes, use on first day covers, and general use, the number of intact sheets existing today are very small indeed. Many of these sheets have become quite elusive to date. The fact that most collectors are content with one stamp for their collection does not discourage many stamp dealers from breaking up their sheets. Even today collectors usually have to give specific instructions in advance if they want the miniature sheets. Many of the stamps found in miniature sheets are quite scarce in their own right so the attempt to obtain the complete sheets offers a real challenge to any collector. The statistics on these sheets will give the collector an idea as to the scarcity of many of these sheets. I personally find the miniature sheets artistically very beautiful and to me these are one of the highlights to my Czechoslovak collection.
