### EARLY POSTAL HISTORY OF SLOVAKIA By George A. Blizil





One of the most desireable sets of postage stamps to come out of World War II is the regular set of Czechoslovakia overprinted "Slovensky Stat 1939" for use in Slovakia, the erstwhile German puppet state. This set is found in Scott's catalog under Czechoslovakia—Slovakia Nos. 2-23, together with the newspaper stamps Nos. P1-9.

The philatelic history of this "independent" state during the year 1939 is hectic. It starts with Slovakia No. 1, which is the overprinted 300h on 10 Kcs. of Czechoslovakia, commemorating the opening of the Slovakian Parliament on January 18, 1939. This overprinting was done from two plates in red orange in Prague. The 2 plates differ—therefore there are 2 types of overprints. There were 790,000 copies of this commemorative overprinted for intended restricted use in Slovakia. The next stamp to appear was the 60h blue Stefanik, which is No. 255 of the Czechoslovak Republic in Scotts.

In late 1938-39 there was political friction between the Czech government and the Slovak government located in Bratislava. At the request of the Slovak government, the Minister of Posts in Prague printed 100,000 copies of the 60h Stefanik stamp in blue. They were delivered to Bratislava on March 14th, 1939, and were intended for exclusive use in the new embryonic state. A few weeks later a shortage of stamps developed in Prague and that Post Office tried to get this shipment of 100,000 returned. The Bratislava Post Office refused and one half the issue was put on sale March 30th in that city only. The balance of the issue was overprinted later. This stamp was printed in sheets of 200 from 1 plate, perf. 12½.

Just prior to issuance of the Stefanik blue, the Bratislava government decided to overprint the remainder of the regular Czechoslovak Republic stamps "Slovensky Stat 1939," thereby creating definitely a new philatelic country, as well as a new field for philatelic counterfeiters. All the overprinting was done at Bratislava, the dates and values as follows:

March 21st, 50h Stefanik green

March 22nd, 10, 20 and 1 Kc.

March 24th, 5, 30, 40, 60h Stefanik violet, 1.20, 1.50, 1.60, 2, 2.50, 3 and March 29th, 25h, 4, 5, and 10 Kcs. 3.50 Kcs. in red.

March 30th, 60h Stefanik blue

April 1st, 3.50 Kcs in blue

April 8th, 50h Benes

The 5 h to 1 Kc. were overprinted horizontally in blocks of 200 (full sheets), except the 25h which was done in blocks of 50 and 100 because of the small supply left in Slovakia at that time. The 1.20 to 10 Kcs. were put through the presses to receive diagonal overprints in sheets of 100. The first run of overprints on the 3.50 Kcs. was done in red on bottom half sheets, and, as you will note above, it was decided to do the top half sheets a week later from a new plate in blue ink.

Not all overprints are uniform and if one was to specialize in varieties, one would run into confusion. Seldom are any of the varieties constant, but European catalogs list dozens. The Novotny Slovakia catalog illustrates, for example, 27 different overprint variety "errors," which look like splattered ink spots, incomplete inkings, etc.

The reason for the current high prices on individual items in this set is reflected in the amounts issued. Just before Pearl Harbor the writer received figures from a correspondent who was a Bratislava Post Office employee at that time. His listings differ from the amounts issued given in the latest Slovakian specialized catalog, as shown below:

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Apparently no one can explain the differences in the two sets of figures. Never-the-less in most cases the figures vary but little and illustrate the relative scarcities in the set.

Only a few months after the 5h was released, and it was learned that it would be a limited item, counterfeiters took this stamp into camp. Other frequently found fake overprints are on the 30h, 1.60, 3.50, 4, 5 and 10 Kcs. Position of overprint characters, color of ink and other small details are the differences between originals and fakes. The writer has successfully established "phonies" in three values, which are in his collection. Mr. A. N. Weiner, of Chicago, is working on these fake overprints through the use of photographic enlargements for comparison. Making these comparisons to establish the differences between genuine and counterfeit is a very trying and exacting task, and Mr. Weiner is to be commended on his undertaking.

An interesting detail exists in the position of the overprints on the 3 high values. They are applied at a 42 degree angle, except for the 25th stamp on each sheet which is at a 45 degree angle and has an extra heavy imprint. This 25th stamp sells for about 20% more than others in the sheet. The 11th stamp of the sheet on each of the 3 high values has a very light ink application due to a plate defect. Forged overprints on these stamps (4, 5 and 10 Kcs) are at almost any angle by the original 42 degree and are very well made. Border coupons found on the 4, 5 and 10 Kcs, were also imprinted and it must be remembered the original color used is dark carmine! Genuine overprints on values 1.20 to 3.50 Kcs, are at angles from 48 to 50 degrees.

At present the complete set of 22 values is selling for the equivalent of \$100 in Czechoslovakia, which reflects the true picture of their rarity. One Bratislava dealer has advertised that he will pay \$60 for good genuine copies of the 10 Kcs.

The newspaper stamps Nos. P1-9 were overprinted in a different style type, known as the block letter, and has the year date appearing above "Slovensky Stat." All 9 values were overprinted in blocks of 100 in April, 1939. Different colored inks were applied as follows: 2, 7 and 10 h, dark blue; 5 and 9 h, dark red; 50h, light blue; 12, 20 h and 1 Kc., orange red. ALL double overprints on these newspaper stamps are counterfeit. Amounts issued range from 2,700,000 on the 5h to only 55,500 on the 1 Kc. This last mentioned value is now selling for about \$5.00 in Europe.

All "Slovensky Stat" stamps were valid for postage to July 10, 1939. Regular Czechoslovak Republic stamps were removed from sale, together with the overprints, on July 31st. Remainders of the overprints (low values) were available after July 31st but were not good for postage.




On March 6, 1939, the first Father Hlinka stamps were printed in Bratislava. These are the first stamps officially printed by the Slovakian government (Scott illustration A1). This 50 h and 1 K set was held back until April 1st when they too were overprinted "SLOVENSKY STAT" diagonally. The 1 K red value (Scott No. 25) exists in imperforate condition, but was not regularly issued.

A few weeks after the above issue of 2 values, there appeared the regular issue of Hlinka stamps (Scott 26-33). On the top of these 10 stamps, the inscription is "Slovenska Posta," whereas on the first Hlinkas (Scott 24-25) the

top reads "Cesko-Slovenska." Two values, 20 and 30h, exist imperforate and of course the same plate flaws exist on both the perforated and imperforate. In this set there are 4 other values which exist imperforate, but were not regularly issued. They are the 5h, 1 K, 2.50 K and 3 K.

### HLINKA VARIETIES - SCOTT NOS.

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The 1939 Hinka issues were printed in Bratislava in sheets of 200, (20x10), perforated 12½ on unwatermarked paper. Printed by the neotype, or photogravure process, the stamps had unusual plate number information on each sheet. On each sheet the information "Al 6.HI.1939" appears twice—on both the lower left and right sides of the sheet. Therefore each sheet contains two plate blocks, right and left. The 10h was re-issued later from a new plate, which had no plate number information. Each value bears a different date as part of the plate number, which is the date of approval.

Listed below are a few of the major varieties that exist on the Hlinka stamps. If these are pointed out definitely as varieties on an album page, they make an interesting feature.

All the above listed varieties are constant, and therefore can be considered as varieties and not "freaks." All these early Hlinka issues were printed in sheets of 200 and perforated 12½ on unwatermarked paper, except the two imperfs, 28a and 29a. These were eventually followed by other Hlinka issues on watermarked paper and other perforations.

A commemorative set for General M. R. Stefanik was released in Bratislava on May 4th, 1939 (his birthday). However, they were not permitted to be used for postage by a Nazi order inasmuch as the General is pictured in the uniform of a French army officer. Genuinely used copies of this set (Scott 34-37) are non-existant. Small quantities of this set can be found cancelled to order and on "1st day covers," but this cancelling was done by some enthusiastic philatelist.

The commemorative Stefanik set was also printed in Bratislava, perforated 12½ on unwatermarked paper. The 40h, 60h and 1 Ks. values were printed in sheets of 200. The high value 2 Ks. was printed in sheets of 100, being the large size format. The only two constant varieties exist on the 2 Ks., which are illustrated in the group of sketches.

Next followed a commemorative set for Rev. J. Murgas, Slovak radioscientist; 2K, 4K and 5K regular issues; followed by the first of several Tiso issues—all of which make up the early postal repertoire of Slovakia—Hitler's puppet state.

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### 1948 STAMP PROGRAM OF CZECHOSLOVAKIA

The Ministry of Posts plans on the following commemorative stamps in 1948:
1. XI. International Sokol Meet. The design for this stamp is the work of Prof. Max Svabinsky and represents the Sokol Organization swearing loyalty to the Republic. From a marching group of Sokols comes forward a young, serious member and a smiling girl gymnast and both salute the appreciative Republic who offers her hand to them.

Stamps for this issue will consist of 1.50, 3 and 5K denominations. The engraving is the work of Jindra Schmidt. They will be printed in the large format with coupons. Both coupons and first day cover engravings are the work of Prof. Svabinsky.

Besides this, sometime in June the Ministry will issue stamps showing two Sokol leaders; Dr. Jindra Vanicek and Dr. Scheiner.

- 2. 600th anniversary of the founding of the Charles University, of Praha, will be commemorated April 7, 1948. Two designs for this issue have been chosen: one portraying St. Vaclav and Charles IV as they appear on the University seal of the XIV Century; the other portrays Charles IV, the founder of this the oldest university in Central Europe. The design is the work of Prof. Karel Svolinsky and the engraving has been entrusted to J. A. Svengsbir. The stamp will most likely be of the large format and values planned at present are 1.50, 2, and 3K.
- 3. 100th anniversary of the Constitutional Convention of Kromeriz. Designed by Prof. Max Svabinsky and will be issued at the opening of the "Exposition of a Century of Czech National Life" in Kromeriz, June 20, 1948. (From another source we learn the stamps for this issue will consist of portraits of Frantisek Palacky and Ladislav Rieger, who were most active in bringing about the reforms of 1948.)
  - 4. 100th anniversary of the Revolution in Slovakia.
  - 5. 30th anniversary of the birth of the Republic.
  - 6. Stamps with a monetary surcharge "For Children."

Besides this, due to the increase in postal rates, it is necessary to change some of the current issue. The first to obtain this change will be a stamp of the 1.50Kcs denomination, showing a new portrait of President Benes, from a photograph by Prof. Ehm.
