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EDITORIAL

JAN HUS COMMEMORATIVE ISSUE



Many collectors in this country as well as throughout the world were surprised when the government at Praha, an avowedly anti-religious organization, honored Jan Hus, the Czech religious, philological and social reformer. The excuse for this commemorative series was the restoration of the Bethlehem Chapel where Hus preached five and a half centuries ago.

Jan Hus was born in the markettown of Husinec in southern Bohemia from which he derived his name. Students of Hus' life cannot agree on the day of his birth ascribing it variously between July 6, 1369 and July 6, 1376. His elementary education was acquired in nearby Prachatice. He entered Charles University about 1389; in 1393 he was given the degree Bachelor of Arts and three years later received his Master's degree. He also studied at the Faculty of Theology and in 1400 or 1401 was ordained to the priesthood. Soon after he was elected Dean of the Faculty of Philosophy and already in 1402 was Rector of the entire University. His career as preacher began in the Chapel of the Holy Innocents of Bethlehem and this soon brought him great renown. In 1406 he became Court chaplain and confessor to Sophia, queen of Bohemia. He was introduced to the teachings of John Wyckliffe and soon espoused most of the reforms advocated by the English clergyman. He never believed himself to be founder of a new religion or a schismatic church; his chief concern was to bring the Roman Church back to the teachings of Jesus and the religious practices of the early Fathers.

Both the King and the Archbishop of Praha were inclined toward his teachings but the Pope declared Hus an heretic and excommunicated him. King Václav was requested to curb Jan's zeal and suggested he leave the city. Hus complied by repairing to friends in southern Bohemia but did not stop his preachings. In October, 1412, Hus proceeded under safe conduct to Konstanz in Germany where, before the Council of Constance, he defended his teachings. The Council, at the instance of Emperor Sigismund of Germany, found Hus guilty of heresy and sentenced him to death by burning at the stake, July 6, 1415.

Hus was a sincere and devout man. He was distinguished for his highly moral life and for his reforms of the Czech language. He was a great orator and the chapel which could hold 3000 people was always filled when Jan preached.

The Church of the Holy Innocents of Bethlehem (popularly called Betlemská kaple, Bethlehem Chapel) was founded in 1391 by the merchant Kříž who donated the site and Count Jan of Pardubice who built the structure and provided for its upkeep. The resident priest of this church received a salary from an endowment but anything acquired above this was to be used as a salary to an assistant and to help poor Czech students. The chapel was destroyed by the Josephites, followers of the Austrian king Joseph who considered himself a liberal but at heart was as much a despot as any other Habsburg. The destruction of the chapel took place about 1786.

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The teachings of Hus had great repercussions in Bohemia. After Hus' death his followers Prokop and Jan Žižka complicated the religious theories of Hus with oplitics and war broke out which ravished the land for 15 years. The struggle was pursued with extreme savagery on both sides; in the councils of the Hussites (as the Hus followers are known) dissension arose and the entire movement broke into many sects some of which adopted heretical and even immoral practices. At the conclusion of the wars only two groups remained; the moderates who were reconciled by the concessions granted by the Council of Basle and the extremists who are now known as the Bohemian Brethren or Moravians.

Where the artist found the portrait of Jan Hus used in this series is not known to this writer. One thing is certain; it is not recognized as a Hus portrait by any Czech of our acquaintance. In the homes of many Czechs in the past years one saw pictures of Jan Hus, his eyes raised to heaven, his ascetic face was beautiful and adorned with a trimmed beard. Other pictures showed him at the Council of Constance as he received the sentence of death and still another as he stood on his funeral pyre with the flames snuffing out a life devoted to the good of man. But then the same artist was responsible for the portrait of Emma Destinnová, honored in a series of stamps and illustrated in last month's Parade of New Issues in the Specialist. We Americans remember Emma Destinn because she sang in our Metropolitan in New York. While we agree that beloved Emmy was no outstanding beauty we refuse to believe she looked anything like the portrait employed in the "70 Years of the National Theatre in Praha" issue. When we first saw the stamp we thought the Czechoslovak Government was honoring the Gorgon Sisters, with Medusa representing these monsters. Even the laurel wreath at first glance looks like a litter of snakes.

As is the case with the recent Czecho commemorative stamps one stamp of every series is unobtainable in the Post Offices and can be had only at the philatelic agency at a cost much higher than its franking value. From a Pofis catalogue of 1953 we learn that the 1.50Kčs (old currency) stamp of this issue is worth 0.10Kčs (new currency); the 3.Kčs is worth 0.20Kčs but the 5.Kčs is worth 2.40Kčs. This highway robbery of the postal administration in Czechoslovakia should be combatted by calling these stamps by their right title: labels. While it is true they can do postal service only a fool would use them. It is like affixing an 80cent air mail stamp to an envelope where a 6 cent stamp would suffice.

CHICAGO SHOW AND AUCTION

Your society has completed 15 years of its existence; a venerable age for a philatelic Society devoted to a phase of the hobby with all handicaps and very few benefits. When the Society was organized, Mr. Schickelgruber came to Praha, performed a major operation by taking a slice of Czechoslovakia, by giving a slice to Poland and another slice to Hungary and still another to Rumania. Then with his magic wand he separated Slovakia from what was the St. Václav heritage and as a grand finale he took what was left by making it a special protectorate and exercised his benevolent tyranny over the land liberated through the personal sacrifices of that wonderful trio: Masaryk, Benes and Stefanik. For what seemed ages to the people of Czechoslovakia they suffered and prayed and hoped. Then came General Patton from the West with his gallant Soviet troops (everybody in Czechoslovakia knows that it was through the efforts of the gallant red army the country was liberated), chased Comic Adolph into his Bavarian hide-out and later into Berlin where this imitation of Charlie Chaplin is said to have met self-inflicted punishment by taking unto himself a wife and then performing hari-kari German style. The big war was over and followed less than three years of seeming tranquility. Then an alcoholic stared with his glassy eyes into those of Benes and assured the professor that a great future was in store for the people under the aegis of Uncle Joe Stalin. After that things went from bad to worse and maybe could have been even worse than that but death intervened; Joe kicked the bucket and a few days later Clem followed suit and a lazy gentleman from the mining district of the land took over. He took whatever was yet in the pockets of his already impoverished countrymen and calling this monetary reform decided that the innocent pastime of stamp collecting must be taken from his people and dished out to capitalists of other lands. Despite all this our society lives and prospers. Our 1954 show commemorates these 15 years of life filled with fun collecting the little bits of paper called stamps.

A goodly number of our members attended the meeting at the home of member Hrivnak despite the weather; it was the coldest day of this winter in the Chicago area, the thermometer registered -7° . This proves that when the members decide to perform a task even the elements can't stop them.

In the past expositions the Grand Award for the finest Czecho exhibit was supplied by the New York group; this was known as the Joseph W. Lowey Award. The Chicago group understands the handicap under which the eastern group operates and decided that come hell or high water this tradition must continue to keep alive the memory of the founder and organizer of our Society. So, as in the past also now a Grand Award will be presented for the finest Czecho showing in the exhibition of 1954. Two sets of awards will be presented, one group for the best three Czecho presentations and another group for the three best foreign (in our case U. S. comes into this category). An old ruling in the Chicago group denies a Grand Award to a former winner of this honor. It is our belief that more members should have a chance at the coveted award but as we agree that we also should show better class material former winners of the Grand can compete for a medal in the Championship class. Kindly re-read instructions about showing your material at the 1954 show in last month's Specialist.

Due to the higher rental of the hall it has been necessary to raise the cost of the Bourse tables but even now they are not as high as those of other exhibitions in the Chicago area.

It is hoped that Messrs. Domar and Reeves will again act as auctioneers at our auction. The committee decided not to have as many lots as in the last show because toward the end many items went under the hammer for less than a song. This discourages the donors as well as those who hope to realize something for themselves while helping the Society.

We hope to announce the names of the judges in the next issue of the Specialist.

The publicity for the Czech papers is in the able hands of member Rosner. He will also publicize the show in the local community papers. It is the wish of all members that the 1954 be the biggest show of the Czechoslovak Philatelic Society. Member Kobylka has been instructed to procure printed signs which could be placed in the exhibition halls of the Chicagoland shows and in the stamp shops of the area.

As in the past a luncheon will be had Saturday night at which time the awards will be presented to the successful participants. In the past these were served in the exhibition hall. It is the opinion of the members that their wives are sacrificing themselves too much for the little the committee realizes from these repasts. Member Kovarik was instructed to contact near-by restaurants and secure a place where a dutch treat can be served.

The next meeting of the Chicago group will take place in the home of

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member Dick Spofford, 5056 Woodlawn Ave., Chicago, February 14, at 2:30 P.M. sharp. Before a decision was reached on the March meeting the telephone rang; it was member Dr. Matejka expressing his regrets he couldn't attend this meeting and would the group meet at his home for the next meeting. As the February meeting was bespoken, the March meeting will be held at Dr. Matejka's home in Austin. Full particulars in the next issue.

From this report the membership at large can see the Chicago group means business. When you read the treasurer's report elsewhere in this issue it is obvious that the financial help received from the 1952 show represented a goodly percentage of the 1952 receipts. If every member puts his shoulder to the wheel our 1954 show must be a tremendous success, both as an advertising medium for the Czecho stamp as also a boost to your treasury. Do not shirk your duty. PARADE OF NEW ISSUES

New Stamps in Commemoration of Josef Mánes and Václav Hollar



To honor Josef Mánes, one of the most outstanding Czech painters, the Ministry of Communications issued on November 28th, 1953, two commemorative postage stamps of 60 h, dark red 1.20 Kčs, dark blue showing his portrait. The stamps designed by professor Karel Svolinský and engraved by Jindra Schmidt were recess-printed in the Post Printing Office in Prague in sheets of 50 copies.

Validity for postage from November 28, 1953.

An official First Day Cover designed by professor Karel Svolinský and engraved by Jindra Schmidt, was issued at the same time.



Two stamps of 30 h gray 1.20 Kčs, dark brown honoring Václav Hollar, prominent Czech graphic artist and etcher (1607-1677), were issued on December 5, 1953. The stamps showing his portrait were designed and engraved by Jiří švengsbír (30 h value) and by Jindra Schmidt (Kčs 1.20 value). The method of printing of these stamps was the same as employed with the issue Josef Mánes.

An official First Day Cover for this commemorative issue was designed and engraved by Jiří švengsbír.
