EDITORIAL

In an earlier Specialist we mentioned that a complete collection of the Czechoslovak Specialist was sold at a Colby auction and we wondered what these volumes brought. A letter from member Klozar of Cleveland informs us he bid on all items and succeeded in getting only volumes 7 to 9 for \$3.50. We surmise that the first two volumes brought in much more than the estimated \$4.00 valuation placed on the lot by the auctioneer. We thank Mr. Klozar for the very fine letter acompanying the above information.

In many previous issues we stated that the Specialist is your paper. We are anxious this publication helps you to obtain material you need and dispose material which may gladden the heart of another collector. Member Rud. Novy of Dallas has been helped before and is again in need of assistance. He is looking for the following items: Scott #296, both types of the Stefanik stamp; #367, without comma at the end of the second line; #368, type II, dash 3.1 mm and finally the 3K Gottwald re-engraved, closed collar. Can you be a friend indeed?

A member writes she has been receiving 2 copies of the Specialist while she subscribes for only one. An error of this sort can easily creep into the work when preparing envelopes by the addressograph. This valuable machine is not the property of the Society and when we use it we usually prepare 3 or 4 sets at a time. A common error is one where the member receives two issues one month and no issue the next month. Your editor will gladly correct the situation if you write to him. If you get two copies each time just discard one copy, or better yet, send the extra copy as a sample to a collector friend and thus help in obtaining another member.

You may have noticed that our vocabulary is nearing completion. Corrections wil be made where necessary and the entire job will be run off and printed on a finer paper stock than is used for the Specialist. Your editor was of the opinion that a printing of 500 copies would be sufficient but at a meeting of the Chicago group some expressed a desire for more than one copy. To make a more careful estimate we request our members to inform us how many copies they'd want either bound in cloth or paper covers. The sooner this information reaches your editor the better. This information will also give us an idea of the cost of this publication.

Our sales manager, Mr. Fritsche, wrote us recently that a member sent him several books with material priced so high that he refused to circulate it. This same member bid at our last auction so low that his bids were not even considered. We do hope that members see the fallacy of such actions; Page 50 April 1955

the surest way to kill our circuit which has operated so successfully all through the life of the Society, is to abuse the features which brought it into being: To give members an opportunity to dispose of their duplicates and to obtain material otherwise unobtainable. Dealers cannot have everything nor have they the time to look for plate varieties or certain cancellations. While we are on the subject of the circuit, if you have duplicate Czecho material, mount it in our sales books and help out others.

Last month we mentioned the International Philatelic Exhibition which will take place in Praha, Sept. 10-25, 1955. The Ministry of Communications has named František Smolík president of PRAGA 1955 Exhibition and about 40 other functionaries on various committees. It is interesting to compare the statement about his show published in FILATELIE and translated for our March editorial with a statement published in The Mercury Stamp Journal (March, 1955), from which we quote: "It is supported but not patronized by the F. I. P. As the first international exhibition held behind the "Iron Curtain", this show should allow an interesting study of philatelic conditions in the Soviet-satellite countries."

From the same publication permit us to quote:

"Only twelve months separate us from the day, when the FIPEX 1956, the International Exhibition New York 1956, will open its doors to the public. It will be a great event in any case, because the show will be one of the initial features at the opening of the Coliseum, the big new exhibition building now under construction at the Columbus Circle site. The combination of a great international philatelic exhibition and the opening of the world's most modern exhibition palace will guarantee a great public interest in the show and will be of immeasurable propaganda value for philately. On the other hand, the international exhibitions, organized in this country since 1926 at ten-year intervals by the Association for Stamp Exhibitions, have proven to be most attractive to the best and most important collections all over the world. Only once in ten years have collectors an opportunity to show the pride of their collecting activities in the metropolis of the New World, which having meanwhile become the seat of the United Nations, is also the capital of the world. Response to the preliminary anouncements of the 1956 show has already been so great that the success of the show in respect to international participation can be considered assured. Conditions in this country are somewhat different from those in Europe, with a much closer relationship between collectors and dealers in all philatelic societies and ventures. The preparations for the big show are running smoothly, thanks to perfect teamwork of all philatelists concerned with them. The Post Office Department has pledged full support and will give any possible assistance. The rules and regulations contain a number of innovations, mainly to facilitate and improve the judging of the show. The first prospectus, which is scheduled for release in March 1955, will reveal all the work which has been done and will give a vivid picture of the most modern and efficient facilities for showing the philatelic treasures of the world to the largest philatelic audience in the world."

We wonder how many of our members plan to attend our International next year in New York. We recall the meeting we had in 1947 when our New York Group was host to visiting members of the Society and two visitors from Czechoslovakia, member Kvasnička, most active contributor to our publication and Mr. Jan Burián. A meeting and possibly a dinner should be arranged by our New York group.

MEETING OF THE CHICAGO GROUP

A very well attended meeting of the Chicago group took place Sunday, February 20, in the home of our National Secretary, John Velek. A discussion of our next show disclosed that it is impossible to get a good hall in the spring and due to lack of sufficient publicity it was decided to postpone our show to the fall season. A suggestion that the show celebrate the liberation of Czech-

oslovakia at about the time of the anniversary, October 28, and that we feature the trio responsible for this re-birth of a Nation, met with instant approval. Several Halls were proposed and our International Secretary, August Hrivnak, promised to furnish details to the General Chairman of the Exhibition, Mr. Paul Marusic, Sr. Committee is empowered to lease a suitable Hall and editor, Frank Kovarik, is requested to begin his publicity campaign as soon as preliminary details are made known to him.

In a discussion about the Vocabulary which has been appearing serially in the Specialist the editor mentioned that several Czech collectors in various parts of the world were most anxious about this our venture and promised to help. One of our collaborators wrote that "ribbon" is not to be translated "pentle, pentlička", merely "stuha". All of the attending members ventured the suggestion that the Germanic "pentle, pentlička" has been used so much by the American Czechs that "stuha" is unknown to most of them. These colloquialisms should remain and proper mention made in the foreword.

The March meeting of the Chicago Group will take place in the home of member Peter Kreischer, 251 W. 108th Pl., Sunday, March 20 at 2:30 P.M. The April meeting is scheduled in the home of member Frank Kovarik, 2502 S. Kedzie Ave., April 17. The May meeting is to be held in the home of member Gus Hrivnak, 174 Addison Rd., Riverside, May 15 and the June meeting in the home of member Doc Matejka, 614 N. Elmwood Ave., Oak Park, June 19. All Chicagoland members are urged to attend and all members are cordially welcome.

After the meeting closed, the members repaired to Velek's stamp room where more Hradčany were shown than can be found in another room of that size anywhere on God's green earth.

REVIEWS

Some time ago we received Billig's Handbook No. 17 which deals with the stamps of Bohemia-Moravia. It is a compact listing and price list of these issues which are, at the moment, definitely taboo in Czechoslovakia.

We recall, when we took the editorial chair of the Specialist, that we tried to outlaw all stamps produced by the maniac Hitler. We did concede, however, that a postal history continuity for the territory of the Republic of Czechoslovakia must be maintained and so we listed the issues as they came to our notice.

Soon after the liberation of Czechoslovakia which was started by General Patton and very belatedly completed by the glorious Red Army, the legitimate government returned to Praha, there to remain up to the unfortunate suicide of Jan Masaryk who jumped out of a closed window without breaking the glass and the resignation of Dr. Eduard Beneš who relinquished the presidency to a wine-bibber who happened to be a willing tool of Moscow's Uncle Joe. (He followed Joe to his grave as a Hindu mama used to follow her Hindu papa.) It is again our wish to follow the postal history of the land of Václav, Charles IV, Masaryk, Beneš and Stefanik. So we continue to list even the obnoxious issues.

The Billig listing includes all the stamps of Czechoslovakia valid in the territory which comprised the puppet state Bohemia-Moravia. It enumerates the stamps of the first republic which remained valid from the time of the entry of the Nazi hordes to December 15, 1939 when all the old stamps were demonetized and the Protectorate stamps became mandatory. It lists and prices tabs and covers. Every collector of these stamps will want this listing even if he must buy the complete volume which includes U. S. Numeral cancels, Naval postmarks, Bahama, Fiji, Prince Edward Island and Trinidad

postmarks, Ireland and Japan cancels, etc. The list price for the volume is \$5.00 and can be had from member Fritz Billig, 168-39 Highland Ave., Jamaica 32, N. Y.

KOBYLKA'S ALBUM FOR BOHEMIA-MORAVIA

We had the pleasure of reviewing the Kobylka Album for the second Republic of Czechoslovakia; we now have before us the Bohemia-Moravia section which is as good and in some respects better than his first venture. Your editor has long identified himself as one opposed to collecting stamps in this stereotyped manner. But lack of free time and the piling up of stamps and covers in envelopes and shoe boxes has taught us that this kind of collecting has its merits and that the merits far outdistance any possible demerits. Needless to say, we are looking forward to the Slovakia section and to the stamp section of the First Republic. With the purchase of blank pages matching those of the Album we are easily enabled to store away our oddities, covers, blocks, etc. We are especially pleased with the listing of plate numbers, which will enable us to know what to look for in this more or less specialized material. We congratulate Mr. Kobylka on a job well done and we hope he doesn't lose the courage so ably displayed. May he long continue to publish albums to satisfy the needs of all Czecho collectors.

Parade of New Issues

New Commemoratives "First National Spartacist Games 1955"



To propagate the First National Spartacist Games 1955 the Ministry of Communication issued on January 1955 the first part of the series of postage stamps consisting of two stamps. The design of the first stamp depicts a symbolic topic of a woman holding a torch in her hand, the second, propagating the winter Spartacist Games, depicts a skier.

Both the designs are the work of Mario Stretti, graphic artist. The denominations and colors of the stamps are as follows:

- The symbolical topic, 30 hal. value, the colour of the recessprint, red.
- The skier, 45 hal. value, the color of the photogravure blue, color of the recess-print, brown grey.

The topic of the first stamp was engraved by Jindra Schmidt, the engraving of the second is by Jiří švengsbír. The bicolored print, a combination of the photogravure with recess-print was executed by the Post Printing Office in Prague on the WIFAG Press by rotary photogravure and recess-print process in sheets of 50 copies. The dimensions of the stamp picture are 23 by 30 mm.

Validity for postage from 20th January 1955.

The First Day Cover for this issue was designed by the author of the stamps and engraved by Jiří Švengsbír.

New Issue of Commemoratives Honoring the 35th Anniversary of the Foundation of the Comenius University in Bratislava.



The Ministry of Communications commemorated the foundation of the Comenius University in Bratislava by an issue of two commemorative postage stamps of 60 hal. and 75 hal. denominations.

60 hal. stamp shows the building of the University after the design by Pavel Sukdolák, engraved by Bedřich Housa. The color of the stamp is green.

The second stamp represents a portrait of John Amos Comenius (Komenský) made after the medal by professor Otakar Spaniel, with an ornamental

decoration, designed by Jiří Běhounek, graphic artist. The engraving is by Ladislav Jirka. The color of the stamp is brown.
