NAPEX PROGRAM FIRMED UP

Bill Sandrik, Exhibition Chairman for the Society for Czechoslovak Philately, Inc., at NAPEX reports that all arrangements have been completed for the SOCIETY's participation at NAPEX '73 which takes place at the Merriott Twin Bridges Motor Hotel in Washington, D. C., on September 14-16th.

While it's too late to plan to exhibit, it is not too late to plan to attend

and participate in the show's many activities.

All members of the SOCIETY attending NAPEX are requested to register at the Society Lounge which will be located at the show. SOCIETY members and their families are invited to attend a Sunday morning get-together brunch, hosted by the Washington Branch of the SOCIETY, which will take place in nearby Virginia. Please indicate your desire to attend when registering at the SOCIETY's lounge. Transportation will be provided.

Our speaker at the brunch will be Mr. Gordon Torrey, President of Rossica (Society for Russian Philately) and current Chairman of the Expertization Committee of SPA. Mr. Torrey won the Grand Award last year at SEPAD for his "Turkish Postal History" exhibit. At NAPEX Mr. Torrey will be exhibiting "Russian Post Offices Abroad." The subject of Mr. Torrey's talk at the brunch will be Turkish Postal History and related topics.

The Awards Banquet will take place on Saturday evening at the Merriott. At least six major awards will be presented to exhibitors of Czechoslovakia in addition to regular Gold, Silver and Bronze medals awarded by the American Philatelic Society.

PORTION OF JOHN VELEK'S STUDY COLLECTION BEQUEATHED TO SMITHSONIAN

The SPECIALIST has recently received word that a major segment of the collection of John Velek, whose passing was announced in our June issue, was bequeathed to the Smithsonian Institution. Mr. Carl H. Scheele, Curator, Division of Postal History, states the following in a May 30th letter of acknowledgment to Mrs. John Velek:

"... We are very favorably impressed with it and wish to express our

gratitude for such an outstanding acquisition.

Within the next several days, we will accession this collection The outstanding work performed by your late husband will be of great use to the many students of philately who do research with us. Moreover, we will be exhibiting portions of it from time to time and are certain that collectors and the general public will greatly enjoy viewing

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such an interesting and comprehensive philatelic study."

In another letter, also dated May 30th and addressed to Dr. J. J. Matejka, Jr., Mr. Scheele notes:

"... Naturally, the collection can be used for exhibition and research purposes, and we intend to do both ... As Ray Norby commented, this fills a great gap in the National Postage Stamp Collection because Czechoslovakian material has not been received in quantities which would enable us to form special study collections. The bequest from Mr. Velek, however, provides the Museum with an excellent and significant group of materials in this sector. The stamps were carefully selected with respect to condition, the research is superior, and the pages have been beautifully prepared."

Members of the SPECIALIST staff have contacted Curator Scheele for an opportunity to see the material and we hope to report on it in the forthcoming issue.

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Kvasnička who exhibited non-competitively, Fr. žappach, small Gold, Jiří Nekvasil, two large Silvers, and a large Silver to Vojtech Maxa for his showing of perfins. Ing. Jan Karasek, Chairman of the Judges Committee reports strong participation by youth members—an aspect of organized philately which we have yet to master.

NEW JERSEY BRANCH HOLDS REGULAR MEETINGS

The first half of this year was a busy one for our New Jersey branch. From January to June, it met regularly each month and enjoyed some very interesting philatelic activities.

The January meeting kicked off with an absorbing talk by Joseph Lacko on the Kosice Marathon. Lacko, who is Vice-President of Sports Philatelists Inc., showed stamps and cancelled covers of this memorable sports event. In February, Mirko Vondra showed his collection of "Posta 1919" along with his S.O. (Eastern Silesia) overprints. In March, Tom Buresch showed his fine collection of Hradčany varieties, including proofs and color trials. Olech Wyslotsky took care of the April meeting by showing philatelic material covering the highlights of soccer in Czechoslovakia. In May, Emil Michaelson deviated from the usual line of Czechoslovak topics by showing censored covers beginning with the Boer War in Africa and ending with Vietnam.

The first half of the year came to a close with an outdoor cookout at the home of our President, Mirko Vondra. Combining with members from the New York branch, the meeting was highlighted with a talk by SPECIALIST Editor Henry Hahn of our Washington, D. C., Branch. Hahn spoke on the 1918 revolutionary issues and buttressed his talk with a remarkable display of colored slides. At the business portion of the meeting, Joseph Stein and Dr. Henry Stollnitz were appointed a two-man committee to undertake to revive the activities of the New York branch which heretofore had been meeting at various members' homes in Brooklyn, but which this year had been somewhat dormant.

Charley's Corner



Czechoslovak philately is replete with overprinted issues, a facet interesting in itself because of the profusion of perfectly legitimate varieties of the various overprints challenging the serious collector at every turn. The overprints of the World War II period are no exception. Several oddities of the first issue of Slovakia, bearing the overprint "Slovenský štát 1939," are well worth considering. They are listed by Scott as numbers 2 through 23, and, although they are not listed by Pofis, many other European catalogues describe them.

The overprint was applied to various Czechoslovak stamps by two processes, one of which was the photogravure process which was used in two formats for different size stamps. The first group to which the overprint was applied includes the values from 5 hellers to 1 Kč. The same photogravure method was applied to the values from 5 Kč to 10 Kč except that the overprint was applied diagonally to fit the size of the stamp. This is shown in Fig. 1.

For the values between 1.20 Kč and 3.50 Kč—Scott #13 through #20—the overprint was applied by a letterpress method, similar to the method used to overprint the "Pošta Československa 1919" series, lending itself to the detection of forgeries by much the same methods. An excellent book on this overprint is available from the Society of Philatelic Americans for \$2.50. It is a translation of a work by Hugo Kaufmann written in Bratislava in



1939; he was a specialist on this issue, and his book is a "must" for collectors of Slovak stamps.

Figs. 2, 3, and 4 show examples of the offset of the photogravure overprint. These offsets are known to exist for both printing processes on the stamp values up to the 2 Kč and for the 4 Kč value shown.

Inverted overprints are found through the whole set. Figs. 5 and 6 show these inverted overprints, Fig. 6 including an inverted overprint on the selvage of a rejoined pair as reproduced from the Kaufmann study mentioned above. The 10 heller value exists inverted in both normal and snifted positions. Other inverted overprints are known for the 20h, 25h, 50h Stefanik and the 4 Kč value.

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POSTAL STATIONERY COLUMN By Wolfgang Fritzsche ENVELOPES

June 4, 1973, for the 27th meeting of the council for joint economic help in Prague which took place June 5 to 8. It is a sideseam envelope, size 192 x 115 mm. The imprinted stamp is multi-colored depicting 3 towers, 2 circles with RVHP and XXVII, several flags and a red star with hammer and sickle. Value 3.60 Kčs (sales price was 4.10) left side of envelope shows a ringed emblem and below the legend: XXVII ZASEDÁNÍ RADY VZÁJEMNÉ HOSPODÁŘSKÉ POMOCI V PRAZE 1973.

AEROGRAMME

May 1973. The current 3.80 Kčs aerogramme now has the legend on back in one long and one short line, 117 mm and 81,5 mm. This is called Type III. The 1971 issue was type I and had one long and one short line on back but they measured 135 mm and 62.5 mm.
