

Nojex '75 Hosts SCP's Convention and Exhibit

The SOCIETY'S 1975 convention and show took place on October 24, 25 and 26th, in conjunction with the 14th Annual Exhibition organized by the North-Jersey Federated Stamp Clubs, Inc., of which the SCP is a member.

The 363-frame show encompassed several categories including Postal History, War Covers, Croatia, Cuba, U. S. and Possessions, British Caribbean, Topicals, Europex '75 and Rest of the World. Many of the corresponding specialist societies met simultaneously, thus making for a hectic weekend. A well organized bourse emphasized postal history and covers.

CONVENTION AND DIRECTORS' MEETING

Our Society's convention consisted of a well-attended program meeting conducted by one of our newer members, Dominick Riccio. Reports were made by the outgoing officers: Dr. Thomas Meeks, Treasurer; Edward Lisy, Secretary; Henry Hahn, Editor; and Mirko Vondra, President. A report was also given by our Librarian, Jay Carrigan. These were followed by our main speaker, Dr. Otakar Kutvirt, who discussed the stamp designs of Jakub Obrovsky and A. Mucha, with original illustrations by the artists themselves. In addition, he commented on the dye and paper tests he had conducted on the 25 haler Hradčany. His talk was very well received and Dr. Riccio expressed his gratitude on behalf of the Society for his fine presentation.

Following the convention, the Board of Directors met to discuss the affairs of the Society. Of the newly elected members to the Board, the following were present: Richard Gray, George Koplowitz and Henry Samek. From the old Board, these members were in attendance: Henry Hahn, Edward Lisy, Tom Meeks, Jane Sterba and Mirko Vondra. Since the old Board was represented by a quorum, it voted to allow the new Board members who were present to participate with full voting rights at this meeting. A new slate of officers to take office effective January 1, 1976 was nominated and unanimously elected. They are: Henry Hahn, President; Wolfgang Fritzsche, Vice President; Henry Samek, Treasurer; while Edward Lisy was reelected as Secretary. The President-elect then appointed Richard Gray to serve as Editor and reappointed the following to their current offices: J. Carrigan as Librarian, Dr. L. V. Fischmeister as Chairman of the Expertizing Committee, Wolfgang Fritzsche as Sales Manager, and Henry Samek as Youth Chairman. A Publicity and Public Relations Committee was set up consisting of Jane Sterba and Mirko Vondra.

Various other business matters were discussed, most important of which was our Society's forthcoming participation in INTERPHIL 76, of which our Society is a proud guarantor. The meeting was adjourned on a note of harmony and optimism.

While all this was going on, Emil Michaelson took charge of manning the Society's sale and display table which at times during the three-day show was a center of recruiting and sales activity. In addition to his able assistance, thanks are also due to Henry Samek for his loan of flags and to Joseph Lacko for his loan of Sokol posters for display at our convention.

VIRTUALLY ALL CZECHOSLOVAKIAN ENTRIES WIN AWARDS

Our Society members' exhibits were subject to the scrutiny of two juries—that of NOJEX '75 and that of the SOCIETY. One exhibit—Charley Cheslow's—was entered non-competitively, having in previous shows gained top awards, including the Reserve Grand at COMPEX '74. A truly magnificent showing, highlighted by such show pieces as the Postage Due "50 on 50", a

block of 4 of the Pč 1919 10K Parliament, two blocks of 4 of the 10K Austrian Seal, Siberian gutters, both "PŘÍZED" on cover, and other rarities, the exhibit would undoubtedly have contended for a show-wide top award had it been entered competitively.

Unfortunately, Mr. M. F. Klozar's exhibit of "Czechoslovakia Town Cancellations in Austria" did not arrive in time to be exhibited. Based on his previous showing of the same subject, the exhibit's absence was a loss to the otherwise fine Czecho participation in NOJEX "75.


Dr. Kutvirt's exhibit of the Hradčany 25 Blue represents the ultimate in research on a single stamp. Mirko L. Vondra's exhibit was entitled "Hradčany—The First Issues" and encompased varieties which were well presented and described. Dr. Riccio's showing dealt with the issues of Carpatho-Ukraine, an area of rapidly rising popularity among members of our Society. Mr. Lacko's showing of Sokol items was an extremely interesting historic study of this popular movement. From a purely philatelic point of view, his showing suffered somewhat due to the inclusion of non-philatelic items. Mr. Michaelson, who has won the coveted Apfelbaum Award more often than we care to mention in recent years, tells us he will next exhibit a page-full of Apfelbaum awards. (On printed pages—no doubt.)





A Message from the Outgoing President

Amidst a great deal of bewilderment, I officially took office as President of the Society on January 1, 1972. The problem then was not one of advancement and expansion, but rather of survival. I remember calling a meeting of what was then the Council at the home of Joseph Stein who then resided in Brooklyn. We were all treading very softly and gingerly on ground that seemed to be mined with booby traps. Not that there were any, but that we all felt one might explode any minute. Little progress was made but at least there was no retreat and no further setbacks.

The Society was almost broke and the membership was down to less than 200. An urgent appeal for donations was published and the response was most gratifying. It helped restore some confidence within the Council itself and the ball began to roll. At the next Council meeting, Ed Lisy and I were appointed as a committee to draft a set of Bylaws to replace a Constitution which had not been too effective. The Society's name was changed to the Society for Czechoslovak Philately, Inc. and it was incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia. The Bylaws were adopted and a Board of Directors replaced the old Council. Henry Hahn was re-appointed Editor of the SPECIALIST and Jay Carrigan was re-appointed as Librarian. The first election under the new Bylaws was held and all the existing officers were re-elected. In addition, Charles Chesloe was elected Vice-President and Jane Sterba was appointed Assistant Secretary. In 1974, the Society participated in COMPEX and shortly thereafter, the Chicagoland Czechoslovak Philatelic Group voted to reenter the Society as a branch. A definite sign of recovery.

In 1975, the Board was finally in a position to vote separate budgets for the SPECIALIST and the Library. The Library was updated, expanded and catalogued through the tireless and unselfish efforts of Jay Carrigan, the quiet one. Meanwhile, Hanry Hahn as Editor, not only brought new life to and interest in the SPECIALIST, but helped immensely in restoring the financial stability of the Society by acquiring new advertisers, launching innovative projects and constantly finding new sources of income to meet the Society's needs. At this time the paid membership stands at about 320, the treasury is in the black despite increased expenditures, and the Society has participated in at least one major show for each of the last four years. Furthermore, the Society has five official branches throughout the country and word has reached me that Joseph Stein, now a resident of El Cajon, California, is endeavoring to organize a sixth branch in his state. Anyone in the El Cajon or San Diego area wishing to help form such a branch should contact Joe Stein at 1110 Petree, Apt. 56, El Cajon, Calif.

Though decided improvements have taken place, all is not entirely rosy. The bulk of Society work is being done by a devoted nucleus of about thirty persons comprising about one tenth of the Society membership. Many of those who have joined have been delinquent in paying their dues, necessitating additional time and expense on the part of our secretary in sending them reminders. Recognition should be given to the fact that our Society is a non-profit organization and that membership dues are still the main source of income and the means by which the ever-increasing cost of publishing and mailing out the SPECIALIST can be accomplished.

As I turn over the reins of the Society to my successor, Henry Hahn, I can assure the full membership that his leadership will be felt and that his main concern is the benefit of the SOCIETY and expansion of our activities as a growing organization. I wish him as much success as he has already had in the past as Editor of this fine publication and I hope the membership at large will give him the cooperation he deserves. Mirko L. Vondra

Numeral 1—Larger numeral, 9.5 mm below the printing control point and the red dividing line. Distance from lower edge of the stamp is 21.5 mm (Fig. 6)


Numeral 2-9 mm below the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp is 20 mm

Numeral 3-9 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamps is 5 mm

Numeral 4-9 mm above the printing control point and the red dividing line. Distance from lower edge of the stamp is 7.5 mm

Type III. Numeral on the right

Numeral 1-9 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 7 mm

Numeral 2-7 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 8 mm

Numeral 3-9.5 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 7.5 mm

Numeral 4—9 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 3, 4.5, or 5 mm

200 h—blue—quantity: 34,250,000 Type III. Numeral on the right

Numeral 4-9 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 7.5 mm

300 h—purple—quantity: 26,910,000 Type III. Numeral on the right

Numeral 3-8 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 18.5 mm

Numeral 4-9 mm above the printing control point, distance from lower edge of the stamp 8 mm

The Novotný Handbook* registers additional sequence numbers which should be described more precisely, especially their placement. Collectors who have these stamps, mint or even used, are requested to contact the author. The following types are needed:

200 h, type III numerals 1 and 2 left, also 3 and 4 right

III. PLATE AND PRINTING FLAWS By Edward Buchta

Just as the study of protective borders and plate markings of this issue remains incomplete, so is the registration, description and publication of its plate and printing flaws. The main reason for this deficiency is an absolute lack of whole sheets and larger blocks. We register here some of the more frequently appearing flaws in the hope that our readers will aid us in this study.

Illustration No.

Hospodářství a věda 1923

- 100 JOO - X - X K

1-100 h Type I (this is a printing flaw)—the second zero has a chipped cit in its left side

2--100 h Type I (this is a plate flaw)—the second 0 is interrupted on the left.
3--100 h, Type II--(printing flaw)—A color spot before numeral 1, another triangular spot above two zeros. A horizontal irregular line is behind the word POSTA. Additional five color spots are around the word CESKO-SLOVENSKA. More color spots and points are under the postmans trumpet and in other places of the stamp.

4--100 h Type II-(printing flaw)—White irregular spot between play piece of the trumpet.

5-100 h Type ÎI-(printing flaw)-White rectangular spot right of the denomination shield.

6-100 h Type II-(printing flaw)-Letter "L" in SLOVENSKA damaged, also the left leg of the letter "V" interrupted in its upper part.

7—100 h Type III—(printing flaw)—Colored dot above numeral 1 to the right. 8—300 h Type I—(plate variety)—In the title "SKA" there is missing in the letter A the left part of the cross-bar and skew line. Above the knee of

the allegorical figure, there is a large white spot.
9—100 h Type III—(printing flaw)—Triangular cut in the letter A in "ČES-KOSLOVENSKÁ".

10-100 h Type I-(plate variety)-White oblong spot in the second K in "ČESKOSLOVENSKA." The spot traverses the letter.

This interesting plate variety is found in the second position of the 5-stamp cliché, two of which formed a row. The entire plate consisted of 10 such rows. This variety is observed in the second and seventh rows. However, other clichet arrangements can not be precluded, since this variety has also been observed in other positions. A detailed explanation of this represents one of the voids in our knowledge of this issue.

The Issues, Surcharges, Cancellations and Vignettes of the Sudetenland

(1880 - 1970)

As a propaganda message on behalf of the "referendum" of December 4, 1938, Aussig used a slogan utilized by several Sudeten towns: "WAHL UND BEKENNTNISTAG / 4, 12, 1938 / IM BEFREITEN / SUDETENLAND" decorated with a large swastika.

Another cachet used at Aussig was one issued to commemorate the Colonial Exposition of Central Germany, September 28-October 13, 1940. It was a circular cancellation bearing the legend MITTELDEUTSCHE KOLONIAL-SCHAU / 28.9-13.10.1940 with the flag of the German East Africa Company and the swastika.

Handstamp Overprint of Bodenbach (Podmokly)

Bodenbach (Podmokly) is a very rich town with 27,000 inhabitants, located in the far northern part of Bohemia on the Elbe (Labe, in Czech), a great river port for commerce in lumber and coal with Germany, not to mention its very prosperous manufactures: machines, chocolate, textiles, etc. With its twin city, Decin, across the Elbe, Bodenbach forms an important industrial complex whose population at that time was 75% German.

Thus it was that Bodenbach, too, had its special overprint to commemorate its occupation by German troops.

Bodenbach's overprint was applied by hand, generally in brownish-black, using the prevailing slogan "WIR SIND / FREI" on two lines with the swastika appearing underneath. It is very similar to the overprint of Reichenberg (Liberec) and only differs in minute typographic details which are easily detected:

- 1. The letter "f" of "frei" is directly under the last stroke of "w" of "wis" while Reichenberg's "f" is under the "i" of "ir".
- 2. The letter "i" of "frei" is directly under the "S" of "Sind" while Reichenberg's "i" is slightly to the right of the "S" of "Sind".
- 3. The last letter of "Sind" is slightly higher because of a little hook toward the top while in the Reichenberg overprint the "d" is straight and clearly positioned towards the left.
- 4. Finally, and especially, the first letter of the overprint "W" of "Wir" of the usual thickness and its three downstrokes are arced and thickned towards the right, while in the Reichenberg overprint the two first downstrokes are practically vertical.

The Bodenbach overprint measures 16 mm. in its longest part (the first line) and 16 mm. high. The small letters of "Wir Sind frei" are 2 mm. high and the capitals 3 mm. The swastika is 5 mm. in overall dimensions and the thickness of its arms is $\frac{1}{2}$ mm.

This overprint is an especially fine one; it was usually applied so carefully that, at first glance, one might easily take it for a typographical overprint.

Another point is that this overprint was always the same size, regardless of the size of the stamp to which it was applied.

Stamps with this overprint are much sought after by specialists, particularly in Germany, to the extent that at a public auction in Heidelberg early in 1966 eight values of this series were sold for 160 DM.

The Bodenbach overprint is among the rarest of the Sudetenland although it was used on at least 52 different stamps:

Coat of arms (Yvert 252 to 257, 298); Masaryk (302); portraits (308 to 310) and Views (311 to 318), or 20 postal values.

Various postal issues, from 50h to 2 Kcs, or 12 values.

Newspaper stamps (Newspaper-19 to 24), or 6 values.

Special delivery (320 and 320a).

Postage dues (55 to 64), or 10 values.

Bratislava souvenir sheet, with stamps 50 h. blue and 1 Kc brown-carmine (Yvert sheet no. 2).

The Bodenbach issue had more than just local distribution; it was actually regional, for it was in use not only in Bodenbach (Podmokly) but also in several neighboring towns: Böhmisch-Kamnitz (Seské Kamenice), Schreckenstein (Strekov), Seidenschwanz (Vrkoslavice), etc.

There were two different types of overprints, alike in general but differing in two recognizable particulars:

In the most widely used overprint-

- 1. the first letter of the first word "Wir" has its third downstroke at the right forming a perfect curve.
- 2. the last letter of the first line of the overprint "Sind", "d" ends with a stroke veering slightly to the left, and top of the stamp.

In the second type-

- 1. the first letter of "Wir" ends in a characteristic vertical stroke 1 mm. high.
- 2. the last letter of the first line of the overprint, "d" ends in a hook turning upwards and to the right.

Besides, this second type was applied not in the brown-black of the first, but in a beautiful brilliant black.

The Metal Hand Overprint of Bürgstein (Sloup)

Bürgstein (Sloup) is a charming little town with a population of 2,000 in northern Bohemia, a summer resort for the people of Prague, who go there for the cool breezes in summer and to visit the ruins of its medieval castle.

To celebrate its occupation by the Germans, Bürgstein produced an overprint with a hand metal stamp which was both successful and original, but not nearly as artistic as that of Rumburg which will be discussed later.

(Picture)

This overprint was made up of a swastika with arms 7 mm. long and 1½ mm. thick, its overall dimension being 10 mm. which appeared above a legend on two lines equal in length: "1 Okt./1938" in small thick Roman letters of which the capitals were 1½ mm. high.

The swastika was put together typographically out of seven different parts in a somewhat clumsy manner. What sets the overprint apart is the fact that it bears the date of the occupation, Oct. 1, 1938. The rubber-stamp overprints of Karlsbad, Haida and Steinschönau are the only other ones to do

The overprint was applied to all Czech stamps in use at the time, but especially to the Coat of Arms series. It is also found on newspaper stamps of the "Dove" variety of 1937.

Everything points to a certain haste in getting out this issue, although the method is such a one as to give excellent results. In short, the printing, although typographic, is quite defective. The inking leaves much to be desired, for some overprints came out a fine bright black, others are hardly even legible.

The Bürgstein overprint was used beyond the town's borders; it was used not only in Bürgstein but in neighboring towns such as Arnsdorf bei Haida (Arnultovice). The same overprint in carmine-rose was applied at Haida (rubber stamp) and in dark blue at Steinschönau (also a rubber stamp). Arnsdorf bei Haida (Arnultovice) also used this overprint in dark violet and also by means of a rubber stamp.

Rubber Stamp Overprint of Haida (Bor u Ceské Lipy)

Haida bei Böhmisch Leipa (Bor u Ceské Lipy) is a small town of 5,000 inhabitants in the north of Bohemia, 75% of whom were German. It is an important glass-making center, the Germans calling it "The city of glass" (Glasstadt). Haida is, in fact one of the centers for the making of the world-renowned Bohemian crystal.

This German population wished to express its joy at being annexed by the Reich with an overprint applied to all the Czech stamps in use at that time: regular postage stamps, commemoratives and newspaper stamps.

They used a rubber hand stamp for the overprint and a characteristic rose-carmine color. It is exactly like the typographic overprint issued by Bürgstein (Sloup) in its size as well as its composition—the swastika and below it on two lines the date: 1 Okt/1938.

Since the overprint is the same, there is no point in launching into a detailed description as the specialist may refer to the description of the Bürgstein overprint.

The Haida overprint can be found on all Czech stamps in use on October 1, 1938, especially the "Coat of Arms" series. It is also to be found on newspaper stamps, which were often used to frank propaganda post cards sent from this town.

The Haida overprint was also used by neighboring postoffices, particularly those of Arnsdorf bei Haida (Arnultovice), Schaiba (Sany, formerly Sajba), etc.

All the overprints and cancellations of Haida were accompanied on pieces of mail by a rectangular propaganda cachet in a 17x52 mm. frame, showing on the left a swastika 10 mm. in length and 1.5 mm. thick and on the right a two-line legend: "Adolf Hitler / had uns befreit!"

The cachet was applied in carmine rose of the same type ink as the original Haida overprint, or else in violet or black. Another propaganda cachet was used at Haida, circular in shape, 33 mm. in diameter bearing a circular legend around the edge "Glasstadt Haida". In the center was a German eagle with its wings outspread 22 mm. in extent, its talons on a swastika encircled with the traditional wreath.

The Karlsbad (Karlovy-Vary) Issue

Karlsbad (Karlovy-Vary) is an important city of northern Bohemia with a population of 20,000, situated on the Tepel River, a branch of the Ohre. It is an important industrial center for porcelain and crystal but is especially famous throughout the world as a watering-place or spa. On October 1, 1938, because of its proximity to the German border, the Nazi majority in the city undertook a very complex and large issue, comprising no less than 56 values,

some of which are very scarce and have risen to the high price of seventy dollars apiece.

Besides this issue of 56 stamps, there were five more stamps in souvenir sheets which were overprinted, as well as three pieces of postal stationery.

At Karlsbad a rubber hand-stamp was used to overprint the then current Czech stamps with a three line legend: at the top the name of the city—Karlsbad, in the center the date of issue—Oct. 1, 1938, and at the bottom a swastika. The color of the overprint varied: violet, red, or green, but never black.

The swastika took three different forms, according to the differences of the stamps: small and thin, large and thick, or very large with double lines.

The legend measures 18 mm. or 22 mm. on the stamps listed below. The entire list of the Karlsbad issues is as follows:


