The Postal History of Carpatho-Ukraine

Part II, Austrian Stamps 1850-69

In his excellent book on the Carpatho-Ukraine, "The Shaping of a National Identity," Dr. Paul Magoesi asserts that before 1848, a Ruthenian national identity did not exist. However, in the second half of the 19th Century, the Ruthenian National Identity was aided by the Magyar nationalistic movement which resulted in a tumultuous revolution by many of the national groups under Hapsburg rule. However, this emerging identity was dealt a serious blow by the Magyar loss on the battlefield in 1849. Before 1848, there were virtually no publications, newspapers or organized movements of Ruthenian people. Some favored identification with the Russians, others with the Ukrainians and most with the Hungarians. Because of this, the development of the Ruthenian National cause was seriously retarded and finally submerged again under the yoke of oppressive Hungarian rule which was in force from 1867 on. However, under the leadership of A. Dobrianskii and A. Dukknovyech and in conjunction with the church, a young Ruthenian self-awareness began to coalesce. During this period, the number of post offices in the area now known as Carpatho-Ukraine grew from 12 P.O.s to 25 P.O.s. The dates of their openings and a rarity evaluation of cancels from this period 1850-69 appear below.

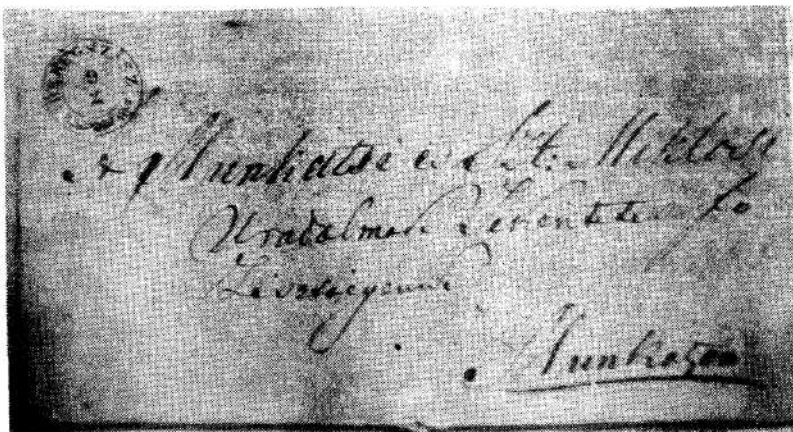


Figure 1 is a cover sent from Beregszasz (Berehovo) on February 9, 1853 to Munkatzon (Mukacevo).

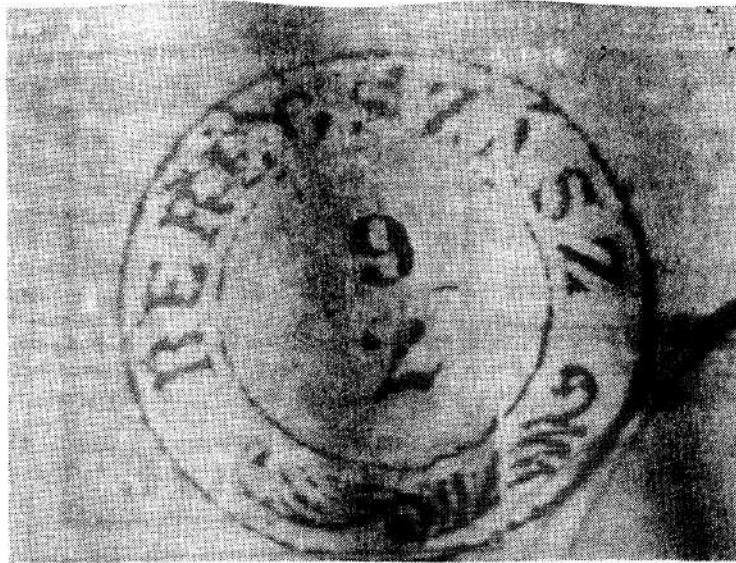


Figure 2 is a blowup of the Beregszasz cancel.

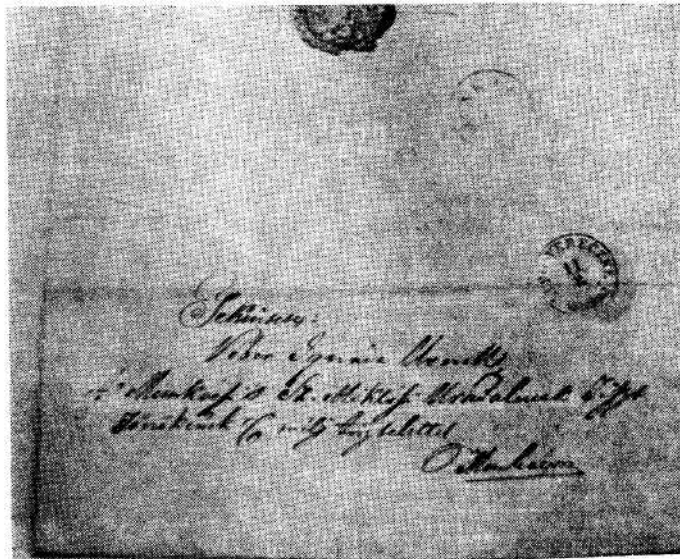

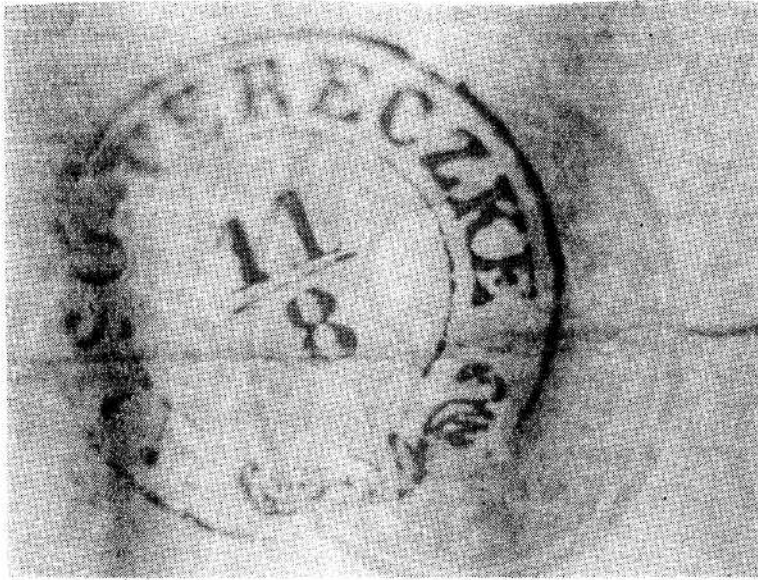


Figure 4 is a close-up of the Also-Vereczke cancel.

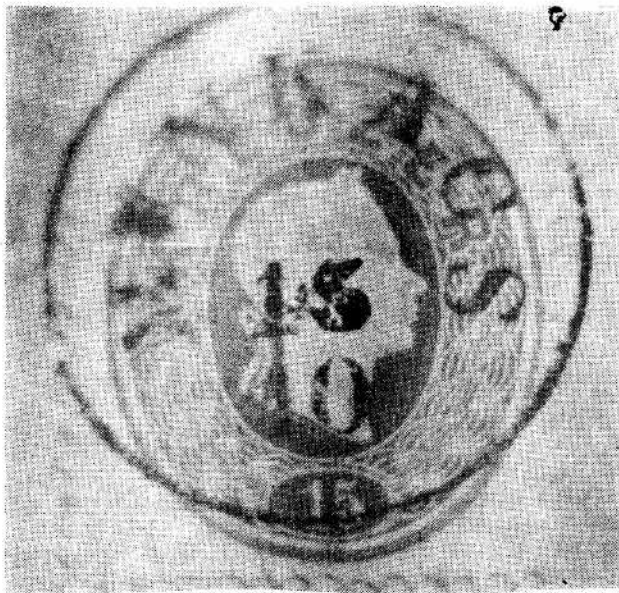


Figure 7 is a close-up of the "Munkacs" cancellation.

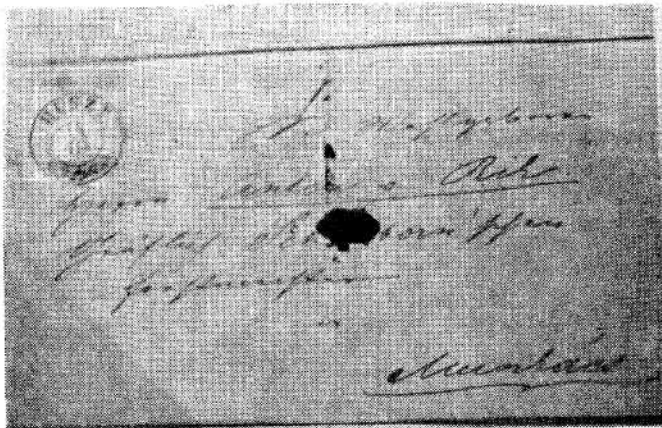


Figure 5 is a cover cancelled with a circular Huszt town and date cancel "14.10" and backstamped "Munkacs 15.10".

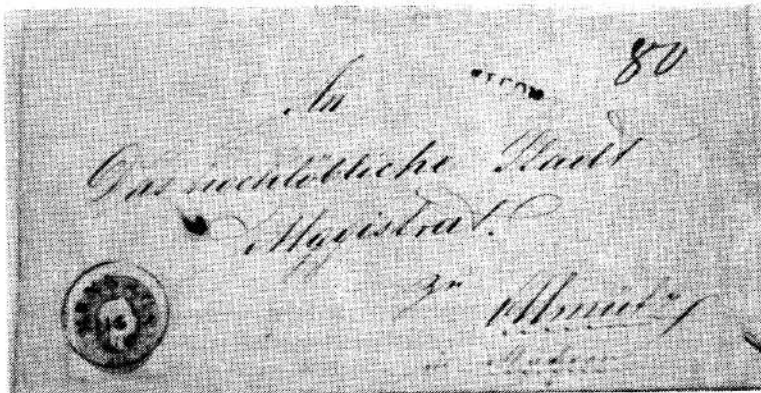


Figure 6 is a registered cover from "Munkacs 13.10" 1862 that was sent to Olmutz in Moravia.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Mr. Editor:

I just had to write a note on the "Editor's Review" in the December Specialist. I believe every collector should read it; also it should be in Linn's newspaper where more collectors would read it.

The average collector cannot make money on stamps.

First of all, I myself collect for the enjoyment of it. I have a number of albums of Czech stamps.

On new issues above, you lose better than 30% because you pay 10 to 20% more than face value and the most you can get is 35% of catalogue value when you sell. So you are losing about 35%.

It is very hard to store stamps. Almost every collector I know loses stamps in storage because of humidity, silverfish, etc., etc. It is especially difficult when you live in an apartment.

It is very risky to invest in stamps. No one should do so unless they have the money and a place to store them. Also only invest in the rare stamps. The new issues you have to keep for twenty years before they appreciate in value.

Dear Sir:

In response to your request 6-12-78, I am mailing you under separate cover, as registered printed matter, a photocopy of my book on "Czechoslovakia Overprints 1939/1945" presented at the World Exhibition of Stamps in Praga 78, and awarded with a silver medal.

The book I sent to Prague is not the final one which I have been preparing for two years, because the invitation from the Organizing Committee to participate at the Exhibition was only received at the end of May, and thus I had to finish the book as best I could to have it presented at the exhibition. You will therefore notice some omissions and corrections figuring in the main part of the book. These have not been made in the abstract and appendix, and thus, if you find any contradiction when looking through the book, these are due to lack of time to make the corrections required and I hope for your understanding.

The final publication I am preparing should be as perfect as possible and contain the fewest number of errors. This is the reason why the final impression is subject to delay, as lately I have received a lot of information as a consequence of having included in my book an appendix on "unknown" and "fancy" overprints and forgeries about which I am receiving fresh information and diverse classification criteria.

This is why I took the liberty of sending you my work, as a person interested in the subject, having a deep knowledge of the same. I should feel honored to receive your cooperation and advice regarding the information collected, which made it possible for me to write the book.

There are significant contradictions regarding the overprints from Brno, Karlovy Vary, Chomutov, Hradec Kralove, Falknov, Ivancice, Kojetin, Uherske Hradiste, Nova Paka, Jevicko, Plzen, Sobeslav, Topolany, Popolcany, Netolice, and others, and I would very much appreciate your assistance and advice on the subject.

There are still many overprints which are not available to me because I was unable to localize the originals, as I pointed out in the introduction. Should you be in possession of some of these, would you be kind enough to let me have a photograph or photocopy.

Finally, I should like to ask you to introduce me to your colleagues interested in the subject and to the members of your Philatelic Society, who could offer me additional information.

Sojex '79—April 6, 7, and 8th

By the time this March Specialist reaches you, it will be too late to submit your application for frames at the Sojex Convention-Exhibition. However, it will not be too late to make plans to attend Sojex '79. The place is Atlantic City, on April 6, 7, and 8th, in the World International (formerly Colton Manor) on Pennsylvania Avenue in the Beach Block. Write Box 899, Atlantic City, New Jersey 08404 for reservations. A special rate of \$40.00 per night, single or double occupancy, is available.

Our SCP group will be having a table during the 3 day Sojex exhibition. You can obtain information there of the Society's activities, together with the exact time and place they are being held. These plans are being formulated by SCP Chairman Edwin Lehecka and Sojex's General Chairman, Alfred R. Bew. The Society members that wish to attend the Sojex Awards Banquet, which will be held on Saturday evening, April 7th, will be happy to know that arrangements are being made that we all can be seated together, in a group.

A board meeting of the SCP board members is to be held during Sojex '79. It would be appreciated not only by your President, but for the best interest of our Society, that as many board members as possible attend. During this board meeting some very important matters must be discussed. An

especially important matter has been presented to the board by the Managing Editor and printer of our "Specialist," Mr. Harlan W. Miller. Mr. Miller has requested that the Society consider publishing our philatelic journal six (6) times a year instead of ten (10) times a year, as we have in the past years. Mr. Miller also suggested that we publish twenty-four (24) pages per journal, instead of the sixteen (16) pages that we now print. Actually this would amount to 16 less pages of philatelic material being published annually. Will the loss of 16 pages or actually one journal a year cause our membership to become disinterested and drop their membership? (Note from the Managing Editor: While it was suggested that 24 page issues might be wanted, there was no mandatory limit on pages set. Issues could be 24, 32 or 40 pages—preferably in multiples of eight—just as some issues in the past have been 24 pages when copy and/or advertising merited it. This is no place to go into more details, but if any Board members, or others, wish to write me, I'll be glad to go into this further.—H.W.M.) This contemplated change, being requested by Mr. Miller, would take place beginning January 1980. The Specialist would then be published in January, March, May, July, Sept. and November.

Another consideration that must be given relative to our Journal is the rising costs of United States Postal Rates. (50% increase last year between January and December.—H.W.M.) Would it be to our advantage financially to have only six (6) mailings annually instead of the ten (10)? It has been the policy of the Board of Directors that we do not raise our dues, IF AT ALL POSSIBLE.

Therefore, I am requesting that you either speak to a member of the Board personally, or forward a post card to me, making your wishes known. A written view-point by the members certainly would be appreciated so that you, the membership, can assist the board members in making a decision based upon the wishes of our membership.

Trial and Error

A suggestion was made that on a trial basis, the SCP journal should list the membership according to the area in which our members reside. It was felt that maybe when members would be listed in this order, that small philatelic groups might be formed in several new localities. In the September 1979 Specialist, the membership will be again listed alphabetically, as in the past years.

Congratulations are being extended to the President of K-Line Publishing, Inc., George C. Kobyłka and Blanka Benesova Kobyłka. George has been a staunch supporter of philately, as well as a long time member and past officer of our SCP. On December 19, 1978, George and Blanka Benesova, of Prague, Czechoslovakia, were united in marriage in the golden city of Prague. May the coming years bring them both much happiness.

The Editor's Review

The next few months will be busy for the SCP as we will participate in a number of stamp shows around the country. Our Society will host a hospitality table at Stamphilex which meets in New York City from March 16-18. On March 17, the New York and New Jersey Chapters will have a joint meeting at the Little Slovakia Restaurant. President Jane Sterba will give a talk and show her material on the Czechoslovak Post in England during World War II. Afterwards, a dinner is planned at the Praha Restaurant and all are invited if you happen to be in New York City for the show or any other reason.

Plans for Sojex '79, where our annual meeting will take place, are moving at full steam. Society Sojex Chairman Edward Lehecka announces that he has applications for exhibition ready and asks that you write to him immediately if you haven't yet sent out your application. As you can see from the front page, the SCP has prepared some very attractive awards for our Sojex exhibitors—thanks to President Jane Sterba. So, please, let's all attend if we can and renew old acquaintances.

Rumor has it that SCP Past President, Mirko Vondra, his lovely wife Ann and their three bright children may be moving to California soon. Perhaps Mirko will do for California philatelists what he has done for the New York and New Jersey Chapters—give them leadership and enthusiasm for philately at the club level.

For those of you who did not attend the Praga '78 Exhibition, one of the items that was in the publication competition was a fine book entitled "Overprints of the Liberated Territory of the Republic of Czechoslovakia 1939/45" written by Juan Santaegenia who lives in Barcelona, Spain. Since I have begun to collect local overprints from the 1939-45 period, I wrote and asked him for a copy which he kindly sent. When I received it, I immediately sat down and studied this scholarly labor of love. It should be noted that this is a work in progress; that is, Mr. Santaegenia is still trying to gather, verify and catalogue all of the elusive and questionable issues of this tumultuous period. It is written in Spanish, Czech, German, French and English and is prolifically illustrated. Indeed this is the special value of this important work. It contains good photos of all of the overprint types that he has personally collected to date. The book is 218 pages long and covers every official, semi-official, local and fantasy overprint imaginable such as the Skalice issues of 1945, the Mucacevo overprints (CSR on Hungarian stamps) and many local Praga issues. It is an excellent reference for both the novice as well as the advanced collector as it gives one a sense of the broad range of overprints that proliferated during the war years in Czechoslovakia. He employs Yvert Catalogue numbers to denote the stamp which was overprinted but assigns no value either to relative or absolute to the different overprinted stamps. This is not a criticism since my experience tells me that it is virtually impossible to determine the market value or relative rarity of 90% of these items. All in all, the book is an excellent start at tackling this extremely difficult and complex area since very little reliable information exists to document the use and history of these overprints. A letter by Mr. Santaegenia accompanied the book, which requests additional information and data on these stamps and it is reprinted in the Personality and Philately column. Well done, Mr. Santaegenia!
